Around World

POPE WILL BROADCAST
Quebec His Holiness Pope Pius XI will broadcast from the Vatican City to the Canadian National Eucharistic Congress here on Sunday, June 26. While the time has not yet been set definitely, it is likely that it will be at noon Daylight Saving Time. The Pontifical Mass closing the Congress will be celebrated at 10 a. m. followed by sermons in English and French by His Eminence, Cardinal OMI, Archbishop of Quebec, the Papal Legate.

EXHORTS JACOBITES
Kottunangal, India - Rao Sahib P. K. Varughese, one of the most eminent converts to the Catholic Church from Jacobitism, was among the speakers who addressed the religious conference here which was attended by 3,000 persons. Seeing that more than half the audience consisted of non-Catholics, chiefly Jacobites, he requested the latter to study the Catholic Church and enter it, since, he said, she is the only Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church founded by Jesus Christ.

RE-TOLENE SIGHT
Ishing China An operation performed by Brother Louis Rumm O. F. M. famed eye-specialist from the "Petersburg" hospital of Shanghai, has been widely discussed through the district. Lumen Service reports that the patient was a girl who had been totally blind for four years. The operation restored her sight immediately, thus enhancing much more the reputation which Brother's patient and skillful work has won him.

HALL STONE FOR CHURCH
Honolulu To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the building of their church the parish members on the island of Maui in the Hawaiian group, are erecting a stone and sand for a distance of more than five miles, have completely restored the somewhat deteriorated structure originally built by the Rev. Gregory Archibald in 1824, of lavastone, coral and native wood.

CHURCH FOR NEGROES
Waukegan, Ill. - The Church of Our Lady of Prompt Succor for Negroes was blessed on Ascension Thursday by the Most Rev. Daniel F. Leonard, Bishop of Alexandria, who also spoke and officiated at the service. The Mass was celebrated by the Rev. M. P. Neff, pastor of St. Paul's Church, Waukegan, and the sermon was given by the Rev. M. J. Van der Putten, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Marksville.

ALL CATECHUMENS
Queenstown, South Africa - At 10 a. m. on the 25th day of June, the Rev. Fr. G. J. O'Connell, pastor of the Holy Trinity Church for South Africa, has taken place at the children attending the school. There have been one catechumen, just a year ago, the chief of this large Negro settlement presided over the mass and opened the school for the benefit of the community. Now he has declared the further wish that the children frequenting the school be brought up as Catholics.

51 YEARS IN CHAIR
London - For 51 years H. J. Payne has been in the chair of Northern Law in the University of London. The Most Rev. Laurence Young, president of a complimentary banquet at which Mr. Payne was the Rev. E. Herbert Payne, of Peterborough was present.

ADMIT C. I. SCIENTIST
Peking - The Imperial German Academy for the Investigation of Nature has just given its diploma of membership to Dr. Peter Sah Professor of Organic Chemistry at the Catholic University of Peking. The honor was conferred on Dr. Sah by unanimous vote of the Academy in recognition of the great contribution he has made in the field of scientific research.

HOLD DR. FUNDER
Prague - Dr. Friderick Funder, doctor in medicine at the University of Vienna and the absorption of Austria by Nazi Germany, internationally known Catholic journalist and Austria correspondent for the N. C. W. News Service, was present confined in a Nazi concentration camp at Dachau near Munich according to word received here.

DR. BOLAND Rejects Red Bid
NEW YORK The offer of the "band of brotherly cooperation" extended to Catholics by Earl Browder on behalf of the Communist Party has been rejected by Dr. Boland. He said the Communist Party has long been a "band of brotherly cooperation" to the Greeks, the Rev. Dr. Boland P. Boland, Chairman of the New York State Labor Relations Board declared in a Communion breakfast address here Sunday. An "eventual union of Communists and Catholics was foreseen by Dr. Boland but he added that "we will absorb them rather than they will absorb us." Such a union, he declared, would require acceptance by the Communists of the Catholic terms of recognition of private property, freedom of worship, and the Catholic concept of democracy. LAX CATHOLICS Seen Intended 'Red' Drive Victims

NEW YORK (NC) Catholics who attend Mass on Sunday but have their own religion during the week are the intended victims of the recently inaugurated Communist drive in New York City. The Rev. Peter Augustin, O. F. M., of the Franciscan Monastery here, said the efforts of the Red propagandists to label all acts of Communism as "fascist" have not been successful, he said, and the latest strategy is to identify Catholics with Communism and thus not only divide the opposition but create anti-Catholic prejudice among American patriots and Catholics.

INSANITY SHOWN HIGHER AMONG DIVORCED THAN THE WIDOWED OR SINGLE

NEW YORK Insanity is four times as common among divorced persons as among widowed or single persons, according to a report of the American Association of Neurological Surgeons. The report, based on a study of 10,000 cases, shows that the incidence of insanity is highest among divorced persons, followed by widowed persons, and lowest among single persons. The report also indicates that the incidence of insanity is highest among persons who have been divorced for more than five years.

Priest Dies in Hungary; U. S. Congress Pilgrim

BOSTON (NC) Word was received here of the death of the Rev. William F. Tully, S. J., pastor of St. Francis Church in Budapest, Hungary, who was a pilgrim to the Thirty-fourth International Eucharistic Congress. He left here May 6.

Schools to Graduate 3,443 In Rites Throughout Diocese

TOTAL OF 650 TO GET DIPLOMAS From Diocese's Seven High Schools

An array of 3,443 graduates of Catholic high and elementary schools in this diocese, their courses completed, will march forward in Commencement exercises in the next two weeks to receive their well-deserved diplomas.

The grammar schools will graduate 273 boys and girls, while the high schools will give diplomas to 650 students.

The total number of elementary school graduates in 37 schools in the Rochester area will be 1,077. In 41 schools of the diocese outside of Rochester, the graduates will number 1,118.

High school graduates in the 6 Catholic secondary schools in the diocese will total 465. In the three high schools outside of Rochester, Elmira Catholic High, Holy Family High of Auburn and DeSales High of Geneva, the graduates will number 104. Hornell First Year High School will graduate 22 and Lima First Year High School 20.

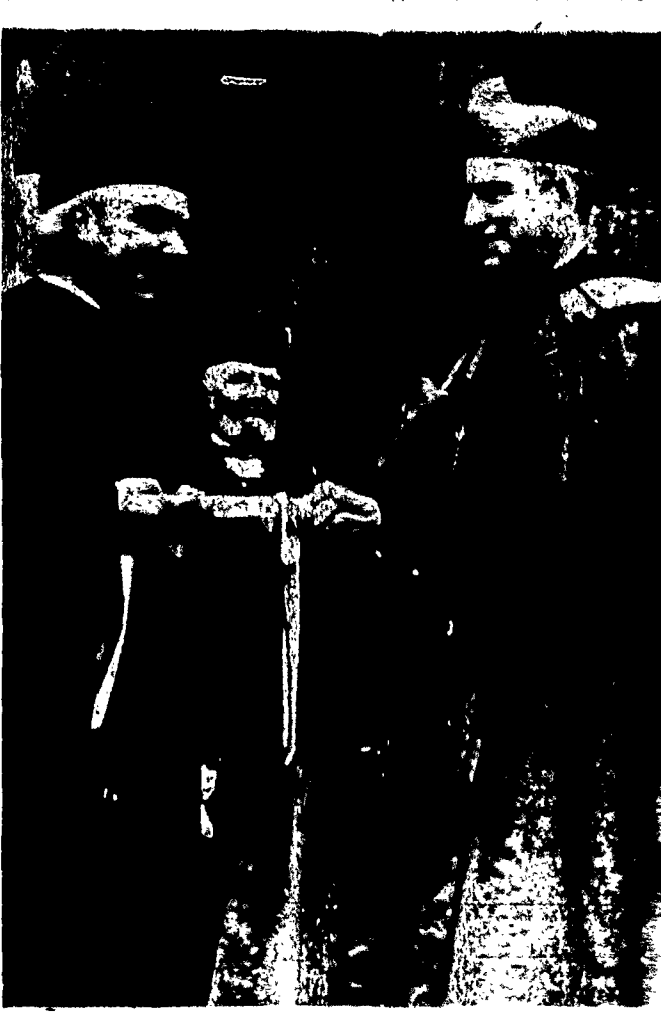
LAW DEGREE GIVEN Bishop Kearney At Niagara U. Rites

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Beneath a brilliant sun that accentuated the colorful ceremony of commencement on the campus of Nazareth College, degrees were conferred Wednesday afternoon on fifty-six young women who had completed their courses at the Catholic college conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The degrees and honors were conferred for the first time at Nazareth College by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester.

In recognition of her "intellectual and literary activities growing as they do out of broad social scope and bearing the unmistakable stamp of Catholic thought, Catholic principles and Catholic spirit," the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters was conferred on Dr. Elizabeth M. Lynskey, professor of Political Science, at Hunter College of the City of New York.

Beautiful Crypt

The new burial crypt is a beautiful creation in white marble, carrying a golden vein with red and blue.

Looking through the heavily paneled doors with windows of stained glass, one can see three burial niches on the right and three on the left, with a beautiful altar of the same white marble at the head of the niches.

Marked in Snow

The body of Bishop McQuaid was transferred to the new crypt where it was laid in 1907 at the rear of the chapel. The body had been previously buried in the plot just in front of the chapel, while the chapel tomb was in preparation.

Claims War Yielding Shipowners Fortunes
