MEXICAN FEDERAL AIDE REBUFFS Foes of Religion In Tabasco State

MEXICO CITY, (AP) A blunt rebuff to anti-religious authorities in the State of Tabasco, where the efforts of peasants to rebuild the Church of the Conception at Villahermosa, were frustrated by former Governor Carranza, recently led to bloodshed.

"All public officials have specific instructions to assist from persecuting anyone who exercises his right under the law and to hear prudently any representation peacefully made to them."

The complete text of the Secretary of Government's statement follows: "Concerning the present conflict in Tabasco this department already had stated its position in a telegram dated May 12 and addressed to the State Governor and the Corps Area Commander of the Army."

The President of the Republic sent a message mentioning the danger of bloodshed as a result of the occupation of the site of the Church of the Immaculate Conception and the avowed purpose of occupying other sites where churches had existed.

"President Cardenas is well known for his respect for the life of the people and for his generosity in pardoning their misdeeds and in shouldering an example to State governors especially to those who pledged their honor that there would be peace in Tabasco and who have given assurance that in the present disturbed conditions they would support the administration in the efforts to make to preserve national unity."

In the Senate of the Republic petitions were received from several organizations of laborers and peasants demanding that the authorities in Tabasco be suspended because Governor Moreno violated the Constitution both of the Republic and of the State.
