Seventy years as a Carmelite will be marked by the Rev. Mother Beatrix, O.C.D., prioress of the Rochester Carmel on Saturday at a quiet observance with the Rev. and Mother assisting as a special Mass in Honor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel.

The Mass will be celebrated in the Chapel at the Carmelite Monastery, 1530 East Avenue.

CAMP FOR GIRLS SET FOR OPENING
St. Canandaigua Sunday, June 26

Situated on the shores of beautiful Canandaigua Lake, Camp Madonna, conducted by the Catholic Women's Club for girls eight to eighteen years of age. It will open for its sixteenth season on Sunday, June 26, at 5 o'clock. Campers will be admitted until 3 P. M.

The director, Miss Kathryn Gaffney, is returning to camp for the sixth season as director in charge. Also returning is Miss Edna M. Evans who will be head counselor and will supervise handicrafts. Miss Evans is a teacher in a school at Jasper, N. Y. Miss Mary E. Platt, who is a senior student at Geneseo Normal School, is director in charge of water-front activities.

Miss Platt's assistant will be Alice Rae Wilber. Miss Jean Corrigan of Geneseo Normal School, will be dramatic supervisor, and Miss Rita Marie Pace of Danville will direct land sports. Miss Helen Virginia Shannon of Milton, Mass., will be clerical counselor and librarian. Miss Helen B. Williams, a graduate of Cornell University, is director in charge of a trained nurse first aid taught.

A physician's certificate is required of each girl upon arrival, and a weight and health card is kept for every camper. First aid is taught as a health measure, and parents are requested not to bring candy or food to camp.

The program set up provides an effective means of combating the hectic and hectic of an over-stimulated urban life. In planning the day's activity, sufficient time is given for rest. Each day is filled with water-front sports consisting of diving, swimming and boating. All counselors are American Red Cross senior life savers.
