

Pope's Words Thrill Vast Throng At Quebec Congress

QUEBEC (NC)—Canada's First National Eucharistic Congress concluded Sunday, with the Pope carrying the message of Christ to the thousands here eagerly listening to his words.

The four days were replete with religious exercises and conferences having to do with the greater glory of Christ in the Eucharist. 100,000 persons were present at the closing ceremony on Sunday.

The Holy Father spoke from the balcony of the cathedral, and his words were heard through the air, the speaking station being from Quebec, that they were being heard perfectly. When His Holiness had concluded his discourse, which he gave in Latin, it was repeated textually in French and English.

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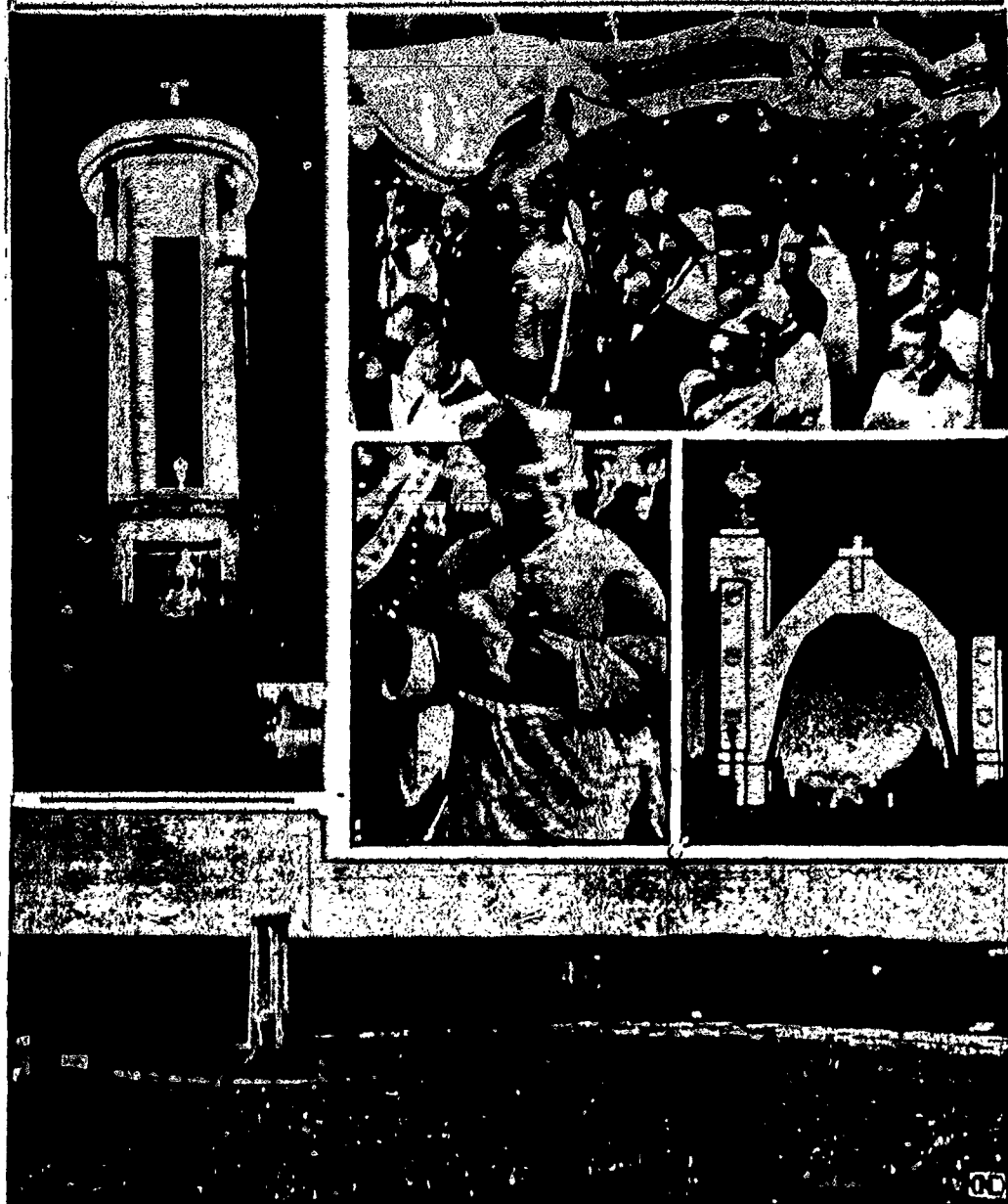
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AT CANADA'S FIRST EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

WAR ON COMMUNISM, LEGISLATURE TELLS State Officials In Resolution

BATON ROUGE, LA. (NC)—The State Legislature unanimously has passed a resolution denouncing Communism and directing all State and municipal officers to stamp it out.

"Whereas we believe and hold that Communism is destructive of religious liberty, free enterprise, individualism and all of the fundamental principles and traditions that have made this nation the greatest democracy in the world and...

"Whereas up to very recently the State of Louisiana has been free from Communism and its evil and dangerous influence, but during the past year the individual centers of this State, as well as some of the country parishes, have been invaded by alien emissaries and agitators who have been sowing the seeds of Communism with the result that the peace, happiness and prosperity of these communities have been disturbed and riot and bloodshed have, in some instances, resulted, and...

"Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, the Senate concurring, that all State departments, boards, political subdivisions and municipalities of this State be and they are directed to take cognizance of the serious situation that confronts the people of Louisiana at this time, and to take all steps necessary to suppress, stamp out and eradicate Communism and its attendant evils, and that a copy of this resolution be sent by the Secretary of State to the heads of every State department, public board, political subdivision and municipality in this State of Louisiana."

N. Y. Jews, Christians Organize Round Table

NEW YORK (NC)—Gerald Carroll, attorney and Regional Director of the National Catholic Alumni Federation, has been named co-chairman with James W. Gerard and Maurice Wertheim of the newly formed New York Round Table of the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

The Round Table has been organized by a representative group of leading Catholics, Protestants and Jews who feel the need in this heterogeneous city of a moderating influence to ease strained racial and religious tensions that crop up from time to time.

FEAR AUTONOMOUS Mexico University Has Lost Freedom

MEXICO CITY (NC)—Grave fears are felt that the National Autonomous University, which throughout the whole revolutionary period has maintained its autonomy and thus escaped being brought under the direct control of the radical education ideas of the National Revolutionary Party, may at last have been brought under this domination.

Due to irregularities in the administration of University funds which were attributed to the Rector Luis Chua Goerne but for which the former treasurer of the University Alfonso Maria Bravo assumed responsibility, the Rector has resigned.

As a result of the University's Chief Government and great credit has been secured in Mexico City, the situation now of the University is in a certain extent of precariousness, a body affiliated with it. The affiliation of preparatory schools with the University has made it possible for at least some private schools to function without following the State education curriculum made mandatory by the amendment of Article 3 of the Federal Constitution.

DENY 'INTERNATIONALE' SUNG AT MEETING

WASHINGTON (NC)—Reporting a mass meeting held in Madison Square Garden New York under the sponsorship of the Greater New York Committee of the Medical Bureau and North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy and N. C. W. C. News Service, the "Internationale" was sung.

The speaker also said that among those in attendance were Bishop Francis J. McManis of the Methodist Episcopal Church, co-chairman of the mass meeting, the Rev. Herman F. Reissig, Executive Secretary of the Bureau and Committee, Dr. Walter B. Costner of the Harvard Medical School, co-chairman of the meeting, Stanley M. Isaacs, Borough President of Manhattan and Jay Aiken, Spanish leftist propagandist.

Some of those mentioned have now stated that the "Internationale" was not sung at this mass meeting. The News Service dispatch was written by a correspondent who personally attended the mass meeting. Hearing a selection sung which he did not recognize, the correspondent asked an attendant what it was. He was told it was the "Internationale." Not content, he inquired of another person present and understood him also to say that the selection was the "Internationale." Having seen the Communist salute of the French flag given repeatedly at the meeting, he accepted it as true that the Communist anthem also was sung.

BISHOPS' COMMITTEE ACTS FOLLOWING Denial of Property To Catholic Pupils

The Committee also by rewording certain parts of Article IX, Section 4, so as to make sure that all children shall be treated alike with respect to their own rights and privileges (not inherently educational, irrespective of the school they attend, or, hold the Education Committee proposal on the General Orders Calendar until such other proposals are reported from Committees that will embody a complete program on the subject matter.

Wife Receives Mgr. Ready

VATICAN CITY—His Holiness Pope Pius XI received in private audience at Castelgandolfo Friday the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.
