Library Sees Added Interest In Books. Circulation of books from the Rochester Public Library in the past six months registered a total greater than three times the city's population, Director John A. Lowe reported yesterday.

Books issued from the Public Library for home use so far this year have amounted to 1,145,568, or an increase of more than ninety-six thousand over the 1937 total for the same period.

Questions answered in the main library for individuals, business and industry have a corresponding jump in number. The 1938 figure of more than thirty-three thousand reference questions is 4,100 greater than for the previous year. The library also assisted and directed 52,988 borrowers.
