MATERNITY CENTER PLAN ENDORSED

BETHLEHEM, PA. (N. C.)—In endorsing a plan for the establishment of Catholic maternity centers with combined hospital and home services, the suggestion of Dr. Frederick W. Rice, noted New York obstetrician, the annual convention of the National Catholic Women's Union in session here, has indicated its intention of cooperating with it.

Establishment of the Catholic maternity centers was proposed at a session of the N. C. W. U. convention Tuesday when Dr. Rice shared the rostrum with the Rev. J. J. Schagomann, C.S.S.R., of Lima, O., who evolved the Catholic Maternity Guilds.

From my experience in the care of maternity patients in various types of hospitals," said Dr. Rice, "I am convinced that it is possible to develop in this country a number of maternity centers with combined hospital and home services teaching institutions which would in time be capable of such extension as to insure adequate protection to all women during pregnancy and childbirth.

In an article in the "Lancet Quarterly," Dr. Rice had pointed to the excellent training given to midwives in certain European countries, saying that "the mortality rate in these countries is only about half that in the United States—3.16 per 1,000 births in Holland (1933) as compared with 6.9 per 1,000 births here (1934)."

Dr. Rice said, "that it would be possible to develop a national service of maternity care through the agency of Catholic Sisters who are now in control of maternity services in all parts of the country. The association of Catholic hospitals should be given present opportunity to provide adequate maternity care for all women, while simultaneously assisting in the training of future nurses and midwives.

Dr. Rice's definite suggestions include the following:
That maternity hospitals be organized and maintained as teaching institutions and conducted when possible with a "home service"; that a thoroughly trained obstetrician be in charge of every maternity service; that the Sisters or nurses in charge be responsible for the care of patients and the teaching of nurses; that the practical care of normal cases, that nurses in training be graduated and carefully selected for this field of work; that special training qualify the nurse not to replace the physician, but to be a competent assistant in protecting his patient; that the authorities should have to depend upon the income received from patients for the financial support of the hospital.

Declaring that the present serious economic situation has led to the spread of the practice of birth control, and that "the appalling and steady rise in the abortion rate in the very localities where contraception is most widely practiced furnishes the clearest evidence of the failure of birth control," Dr. Rice said "it is felt there should be some way to furnish protection to Catholic mothers through Catholic maternity hospitals. With their close approach to the family through nurse social worker, physician and Sister, they could assist inform Catholic parents regarding the serious moral and physical consequences of using contraceptives.
