A SEWING CIRCLE BUILDS A CHURCH

Twenty-nine women met one day in November 1911 at the invitation of the late Rev. Francis X. Kunz. He was then assistant pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, Hudson Avenue, and the women for the most part, housewives who liked to sew.
From this small beginning has resulted the local chapter, Household 118, Order of Martha with twenty-four active members and approximately 1,000 associate members. Affiliated as an auxiliary to the Catholic Church Extension Society, the purpose of the Order of Martha is to assist in the establishment of new mission chapels in the west and southwest by furnishing altar linens and vestments for mission priests.
The first year following its organization, the local Order of Martha sent 456 pieces of altar linens to the National Director. This represented many collective hours of sewing, but cheered by the results of their first year, they continued meeting once a week and turned their attention to more difficult tasks. They began to fashion vestments work by the priest.
Fashioned by hand
This work was most particular as each vestment had to be cut and stamped and the designs worked by hand. Dress and altar linens, First Communicants were also made and sent to the national office. From time to time social functions were held and funds raised for special donations to the missions.
The 1917 Church was erected at Circle, Montana, and later another established at Amon, Casus, Puerto Rico, both being made possible through the generosity of the local Households. By 1921 this annual work had contributed more than \$5,000 in cash, vestments, altar plates and linens.
Father Kunz was assigned to St. Francis Xavier Church, St. Street, as pastor in 1922. The Order transferred with him. Father Kunz took an even greater interest in the society he had organized. He interested the bishop and other priests in the work and instigated a drive for assisting missions in furnishing their work. Through his efforts almost 2,000 members, men and women in every walk of life, became affiliated as passive members.
Founder Passes On
Before the Order of Martha could celebrate its 25th anniversary of its founding, Father Kunz was taken ill. On May 16, 1936 he died, happy in the realization that he had started a great work and certain that the women would carry on. Nor did they fail him in his dreams. They went on to even greater glory working all the harder for his sake. They realized a long felt ambition late last year with the dedication of the Church of St. Francis Xavier at Eden, Montana, as a memorial to Francis Xavier Kunz, their founder and spiritual director.
This church was erected and dedicated through the efforts, contributions and work of the local Order of Martha. Today it stands as a lasting monument, a place where religion may be brought to others, where this work done to the honor of Father Kunz and the Order of Martha may be perpetuated.

Stenographers' Patron Honored
PARIS - The city of Arles has just celebrated the feast of St. Georges, patron of stenographers. St. Georges lived long before the invention of the typewriter. He was born at Arles toward the close of the third century. He performed the duties of a notary. He at the time transcribed public acts and reconstituted, word for word the speeches delivered in the forum. He suffered martyrdom.
There are numerous churches in southern France dedicated to him and a number of villages bear his name. Near the site of his death a chapel has been built in 1922 where stenographers were holding a congress at Arles. They directed a pique on the facade of this chapel in honor of their patron.

Reds Restrict Foreign Envoys At Religious Events
PARIS - At the instance of Lattinoff, commissaire of Foreign Affairs in Russia, Stalin has decided to permit Soviet diplomats abroad to attend religious ceremonies, but under strict conditions and for the purpose of making it possible for Russian representatives to attend official functions, according to word received here.
The ruling, which applies also to the military, marine and aviation, refers to ceremonies of a religious character organized by a government-official funerals, weddings, baptisms - and even then diplomats must obtain permission to attend at least 24 hours in advance of the ceremonies. Beyond that, the diplomats are not allowed to attend religious ceremonies or any ceremony where a religious group participates even indirectly.
