"were so devilish," the billingsgate used in the speech was so much of the gutter, and "the falsehoods so deliberate," that "if the emotional, incited-auditors of the speech in Albert Hall had come out in the streets and attacked members of the English hierarchy and priests there would have been no occasion for surprise."

"Free speech is sanctioned to the limit in this country. The Catholic Review editorial adds, "but no Communist nor anybody else, would have been permitted even in the U. S. A. to utter such falsehoods and such vulgarities against the President of the United States or any other official or individual in this country or any other country."

Asserting that it had intended to say more about the broadcast, the paper states it "now accepts the assurance of Station WQAD that it will publish such stuff as projected by it."

job with the WPA writers' group and that he "stayed in until September 1, 1938." Soon after getting the WPA job, he said, he was invited to attend a "lecture" which turned out to be a Communist Party meeting, and he was "surprised to find that at least 40 per cent of those at the meeting" were his fellow workers on the project. He said the "understood procedure was that persons sent by the Workers Alliance are to be taken care of" that "they're the ones who get the jobs." Few persons got writers' jobs without approval from the Alliance, he declared, the exceptions being individuals of such extraordinary qualifications that they might be "turned down without difficulty."

Asked by Representative Joe Starnes of Alabama, Chairman of the sub-committee holding hearings here, whether any Communist had been in the office, the releasing of funds for war relief in China and Spain, and the recruiting of volunteers for service with the United States Army, Mr. Bantz said the party provides tin cans for the collection of funds, and that "the recruiting activities have been carried on continuously."

For this purpose this week has been set aside as Retail Demonstration Week supervised by the Retail Merchants' Council of the Chamber of Commerce. The store owners as a part of a national observance planned by the National Retail Dry Goods Association.

A few of the facts given to emphasize the importance of retailing in this city are cited in this week's issue of the "Rochester Chamber of Commerce" published by the Chamber of Commerce as follows:

The stores made over counters of Rochester retail stores annually reach a grand total of \$132,420,000.

That consistently during each month of 1938 retail employment in Rochester has shown increased stability as compared with the corresponding months of 1937, and during the same period has surpassed the average struck by New York State.
