Graves At Holy Sepulchre Blessed In Solemn Rite

With approximately 2000 of the faithful present to offer prayers for the souls of their dead, His Excellency, Bishop Kearney on last Sunday conducted the always impressive ceremony of Blessing of Graves at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

At the conclusion of the procession through the lanes of the beautifully landscaped cemetery, the Bishop mounted a temporary platform addressing the throng on the importance of returning to the Church.

"We have come today to honor the mortal remains of our faithful departed, thoroughly conscious of the importance of our attitude toward death," His Excellency declared from the platform in front of All Souls Church.

"We are aware of the criticism of our opposition to the use of modern methods of cremating the dead and the utterance of disrespect for the human body. The body of man is the temple of the Holy Ghost and as such demands respect."

The Bishop, accompanied by priests and members of the Knights of St. John in full dress uniform in command of Colonel Frederick J. Wegman.

An opportunity was given those present to visit the new mausoleum crypt in which repose the remains of the late Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid.

PARISH PRAISED BY BISHOP KEARNEY For Progress Made In Forty Years

It was a happy feeling that prevailed at St. Augustine's Church last Sunday morning as its fortieth anniversary was celebrated with a Pontifical Mass by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester.

At the conclusion of the Mass, His Excellency said that two thoughts came to his mind as he celebrated the Mass, one was a thought of the past and a prayer of thanksgiving; the other a thought of the future and a prayer for the continuance of God's blessing upon the Church.

In reviewing the forty years since the parish was founded, the Bishop said it was easy to visualize the countless number of souls who have been brought forth for baptism; the weary footsteps which have approached the confessional for relief; the crowds coming to Holy Communion, the series of Bishops administering confirmation to give strength to souls and to make them true soldiers of Christ, the souls carried for the last visit before the altar and who were joining in this Mass of thanksgiving, the priests with the ambition of giving heaven for the parishioners.

All this, Bishop Kearney said, proves that forty years is but a moment in the life of the Church. The forty years represent not a material, but rather a spiritual history.

Of the thought and prayer for the future, the Bishop expressed the hope that those of present and future may be worthy of the tradition handed down by predecessors.

In congratulating pastor and people, the Bishop reminded that prayer is man's help and any problem can be solved by prayer. There is no greater blessing than a strong praying and sacrificing people the Bishop declared.

Pastor Speaks on Occasion
The Rev. John H. O'Brien, beloved pastor of St. Augustine's, recalled its early days and how the parish grew.

"Bishop McQuaid, looking about his diocese, saw the necessity of a school for children of the west end and sent some of the priests of the Cathedral to find a place for them. Forty years ago on the seventeenth of September," Father O'Brien said.

"Since then, with the help of God, and with the help of a wonderful people, we have been able to carry on, increase and build up a wonderful organization, today our thoughts go first to God Almighty, who has kindly and mercifully watched over us, showering His marvelous blessings upon us."
