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CORNELL STUDENTS ACCLAIM NAMING Of Father Cleary As Full Time Chaplain

By ROBERT MOORENICK. ITHACA—Appointment by His Excellency, Bishop Keane, of the Rev. Donald M. Cleary as full time chaplain to the students at Cornell University has been received with great favor here.

While Father Cleary has carried on the work at Cornell for the past two years, he had other duties at the local parish as well.

Bishop Keane realizing the importance of having a priest devote all of his time to the university work, appointed Father Cleary to do this work both at Cornell and Ithaca College.

Chaplain Named in 1936. This year has been a Catholic Club at Cornell for fifty years and a Newman Club for twenty-five years. It was not until 1923 that a chaplain was appointed.

The chaplain then was the Rev. James Cronin who after serving a year left Cornell to assume a teaching position at Fordham University. From that time until the present the work has been carried on by the priests of the Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca.

Through an arrangement with the university the 400 Catholic students at Cornell have an opportunity to attend Mass on the campus each Sunday, Holyday and First Friday.

A complete program of religious, cultural and social activities is carried out each week consisting of retreats, corporate Communion, Holy Mass, etc.

Father Cleary also conducts classes in Scholastic Philosophy and Religion. He has an office in Barnes Hall on the campus where he is available for consultation with the students.

At a recent convention of the Newman Clubs held in Washington, September 2, 3 and 4, the Cornell Newman Club won the award granted to the largest Newman Club in the country and a second award for its monthly publication, "The Sentinel."

Father Cleary was ordained at St. Bernard's Seminary in June, 1912. His first appointment was to Holy Family Church at Auburn. He worked in that parish for eight years where he acted as Chaplain at Auburn Prison from 1921 to 1931 and as Principal of Holy Family High School, Ithaca, N. Y., from 1931 to 1937.

While associated with that school he organized the Auburn Sodality Union. He was appointed to Ithaca June 1937.

Besides carrying on his duties as chaplain at Cornell and Ithaca College, Father Cleary is enrolled in the graduate school as a candidate for a master's degree majoring in International Law.

Work Appreciated. Father Cleary has done excellent work at Cornell. He has created an interest in Catholic education among the Catholic students which before his time was seriously lacking.

The students at Cornell love and respect him. He is a great leader and the Catholics of this diocese should be proud to have as their representative at the University, one of the leading educational institutions in the country, a man with the intelligence and personality of Father Cleary.

Union Workers Form Speaker's Bureau. DETROIT (NC)—A Speakers' Bureau of persons qualified to address parades and meetings has been established by the Detroit Association of Catholic Trade Unionists as part of an extensive educational program among Catholic workers here. The Catholic Trade Unionists movement has spread to Pontiac, where a local group is being formed under the direction of the Detroit unit. The association also announced the publication of a bi-weekly bulletin containing information of interest to Catholic workers. The envelope contained the names, but no addresses or other information, of 1,762 Basque children. A number had been placed opposite each child's name. Ages also were recorded. Parents' names and addresses, however, were not listed.

On other records captured at Gijon, only the Christian names of the children were entered on cards, together with numbers. There were no names or parents' names on addresses, destinations or any other information about who they were and where they were sent.

In Bilbao alone there are approximately 200 mothers or fathers who have asked assistance from church or Nationalist authorities in locating and repatriating their children. The children of at least 400 of these families are thought to be in Soviet Russia or Mexico.

The parents of these "lost" children are pathetic reminders of what is described to the writers by Father Henry Gahan, former chaplain of English-speaking Catholics at Barcelona, as "the greatest tragedy and the most monstrous crime of the Spanish Civil War." (Copyright, 1938, N.C.W.C.)

CONSECRATION DATE For Bishop Thill Set for Oct. 28

CINCINNATI (NC) The Most Rev. Frank A. Thill, Bishop-elect of Concordia, will be consecrated at solemn ceremonies to be held in the new Cathedral of St. Monica here on October 28.

The Most Rev. John T. McNicholas, O.P., Archbishop of Cincinnati, will be the consecrating prelate. He will be assisted by the Most Rev. Francis J. L. Beckman, Archbishop of Dubuque, and the Most Rev. Urban J. Vehr, Bishop of Denver.

The date of the consecration is the Feast of the Apostles St. Simon and Jude.

Bishop Thill is the eighty-eighth member of the clergy of this archdiocese to be elevated to the hierarchy and he will be the twenty-third Bishop consecrated in this city.

DEVICE TO AID DEAF In Confessional Is Given Parish on Jubilee

LOS ANGELES—One of the most valuable gifts received by St. Joseph's Parish on the occasion of its recent golden jubilee was that of a confessional in aeration donated by the Dictograph Products Company of New York.

The gift was presented by Harry H. O'Connor, Supervisor of the local Dictograph Company.

In the course of his remarks Mr. O'Connor pointed out that there are more than 150,000 deaf adults and three million children classified as among the hard of hearing who are able to enjoy normal conversation through such mechanical aids.

FAITH IN CHRIST Key To Eucharist Avers Archbishop

NEW YORK—Faith in Christ is the key to the mystery of the Eucharist, said the Most Rev. Joseph P. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans Sunday night in the first of three addresses he is giving over the "National Catholic Hour".

Speaking on "Eucharist—God with us," Archbishop Rummel, in whose See City the Eighth National Eucharistic Congress will be held October 17-20, said "the Holy Eucharist is the focal mystery of our Catholic faith, the beacon light whose brilliant rays illumine with rare brightness every phase of Catholic worship, the fountain whence souls draw spiritual life, vigor, and energy, the realization of God's marvelous desire to be with the children of men by communion on man's highest ambition with His Maker and to anticipate, in a measure, the capturing joy of the beatific vision of the 'countenance of God in heaven.'"

"Firm, unmovable, and constant is the doctrine of the Catholic Church that the Holy Eucharist contains the body and the blood, the whole and divine of Jesus Christ, the Incarnate Son of God under the forms of bread and wine." His Excellency went on.

"Nothing short of this belief will explain or justify the liturgy, the prayer, the sacrament of the Eucharist. Her most solemn function as well as the simple devotional practices in which her children find delight, strength, and solace, are inspired by the doctrine of the Real Presence."

British Mediator Is Guest of Archbishop. PRAGUE. Britain's mediator in the Sudean negotiati on, Viscount Walter Runciman, and Lady F. de Runciman were week end guests of His Eminence Karel Cardinal Kaspar, Archbishop of Prague.

Lord and Lady Runciman were invited by Cardinal Kaspar to visit the summer residence of the Prague Archbishop at Brachyva. The British diplomat and his wife were guests of the cardinal at a dinner in their honor. During their sojourn the three flags were hoisted at the castle's spire. Papal, British and Czechoslovak.
