Millions Hear Pope Pius Make Stirring Appeal To World To Preserve Peace

PONTIFF, ON RADIO EXHORTS FAITHFUL TO 'UNDAUNTED AND INSISTENT PRAYER'

VATICAN CITY (NO.)—Speaking in the quiet of his private library at Castelgandolfo, but with radio carrying his voice to anxious millions in distant places, the Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, last Thursday evening invited bishops, priests, religious and the laity to join with him in "most undaunted and insistent prayer" for the preservation of peace.

Speaking in Italian, but concluding his remarks with the Apostolic Benediction given in Latin, Pope Pius recommended that all Catholics have special devotion to the Blessed Virgin during October, the month dedicated to the Holy Rosary.

It was a time weighted with historic importance, and the Holy Father spoke with evident emotion. He reminded his faithful that the destinies of the world rest in the hands of God, and he urged prayer that peace be preserved "in justice and charity."

Prayer For Peace

Expressing deep gratitude for the supplications which the faithful of the whole Catholic world have made and continued to make for him, Pope Pius offered "for the salvation and for the peace of the world" the Holy Father, in virtue of those prayers the Lord has spared and even renewed.

On the eve of this special broadcast, Pope Pius took occasion in many addresses to mention the gravity of the situation confronting the world. To him, the Holy Father said in these addresses, the threat to the common welfare and to the Church is supremely real. No body can feel this more than he, the Holy Father, who has seen the crisis on Wednesday, and he exhorted all who visited him to pray for his intentions, which he told them are for the whole world now menaced and in a perilous situation. He said that the prayers of the Holy Father and his spiritual children.

Thursday, in his radio broadcast, Pope Pius called upon the faithful to have recourse to the "armed but invincible power of prayer," that those who govern may be sustained "in confidence in the peaceful ways of faithful negotiations and of lasting agreements."

The Holy Father's message to the world follows:

"While millions of men still live in dread because of the imminent danger of war and because of the threat of unemployment and ruin, we gather into our paternal heart the trepidation of our children and we invite bishops, clergy, the religious and the faithful to unite themselves with us in the most undaunted and insistent prayer for the preservation of justice and in charity, of the peace."

Robert All To Pray

"To this unarmed but invincible power of prayer let the people have recourse, once again that God—in whose hands resteth the destinies of the world, may sustain especially at these moments in those who govern confidence in the peaceful ways of faithful negotiations and of lasting agreements, and that they may inspire in all sentiments and actions corresponding to the resolution of peace, which will be called to foster peace and to establish it upon the secure basis of law and of the Gospel teachings."

"Grateful beyond words for the prayers which have been and are being poured out for us by the faithful of the whole Catholic world, with all our heart, we offer for the salvation and for the peace of the world this title which in virtue of those prayers, the Lord has spared and even renewed."

"Let the Lord of life and death, if He wills, take from us the insupportable grief of an already long life, or if He wills, let Him prolong still further the laborious days of His afflicted and weary toiler."

"Our offer is all the more assured of gracious acceptance because it is the morning of a liturgical commemoration of the meek and heroic martyr, St. Theresia, and because it is the eve of the Feast of the Holy Rosary, of the month of the Holy Rosary when all over the Catholic world will be multiplied, as we also earnestly recommend, the fervor and the frequency of the devotion which has already on many occasions brought about the great and beneficent intervention of the Blessed Virgin in the destinies of afflicted humanity. It is with the full confidence that these recollections inspire that we give to all the great Catholic family and to all the human family our paternal Benediction."

Program Completed Listing Religious and Civic Events OF National Eucharistic Congress

NEW ORLEANS (NO.)—The complete program of general religious and civic events for the Eighth National Eucharistic Congress was released today by the Most Rev. Joseph F. Hummel, Archbishop of New Orleans and patron of the Congress.

In addition to his Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, who will, as Papal Legate, represent the Holy Father, there will be in attendance the Most Rev. Andro Giovanni Cioffanti, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, Postmaster-General James A. Farley will represent President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Beginning early Tuesday, October 18, and continuing through the Congress, the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed in St. Louis Cathedral. It will be exposed with sacramental Benediction at 8 p. m. Thursday, October 20.

Masses will be said from 5 to 8 a. m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in the Municipal Auditorium and Holy Communion may be received there. Holy Communion will not be distributed at any of the special Congress Masses.

and higher education. It was chiefly by the united strength in the National Catholic Welfare Conference that the famous Oregon School Case was fought and won before the Supreme Court of the United States which declared the liberty-giving principle insuring the permanency of our Catholic schools in the hallowed words: "The child is not the mere creature of the State. Those who nurture him and direct his destiny have the right, coupled with the high dignity to educate him in their own religion and in their own home."

"The burden of providing Christian education in our schools does not stop when buildings are erected and teachers trained. The task charged to the N. C. W. C. is a continuing experience in vigilance. For twenty years the Bishops of the United States through the N. C. W. C. have encouraged the study and application of the religious principles dealing with other interests with the rights and duties of workers, family life, education and Catholic Action. In pastoral letters, pronouncements and statements they have year after year brought before the American people principles of Catholic social teaching pertinent to prevailing conditions.

"Catholic Action is essential. You will recognize in this outline one of the essential of true Catholic Action: the participation of the laity in the apostolate of the hierarchy. And here it should be remarked, in the words of our Bishops assembled in General Meeting in 1932 that Catholic Action is not to be confused with Catholic activity. Catholic Action is a balanced division of responsibility in Catholic social work. The laity participates in the program of the hierarchy on matters of national interest affecting the welfare of the Church and the nation known through the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

"The present occasion of this Catechetical Congress emphasizes the necessity of a coordinating center for Catholic national work, the jurisdiction and responsibility for religious instruction programs in the individual dioceses are in no way affected but all participating in this national demonstration give a tremendous impetus to the cause generally and receive on the other hand manifold benefits from common association in Catholic work."
