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MEDICAL CARE OF INDIGENT SET For Special Study At Charities Meet

RICHMOND (N.C.)—Two thousand delegates are expected to attend the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, to be held here October 9 to 12, and which will bring together representatives of all types of charitable work under the auspices of the Catholic Church.

Representing the Diocese of Rochester will be the Rev. Gerald C. Laramber, diocesan director, Rochester Catholic Charities and the following Sisters active in welfare work in this diocese: Sister M. Martina, superintendent of St. Mary's Hospital; Sister M. Mildred and Sister M. Lorenzo of St. Mary's Boys' Home; Sister M. Benigna and Sister M. Cirilda of St. Ann's Home for the Aged; Sister M. Patricia of Nazareth College; Sister M. Edith and Sister Marie Celine of St. Patrick's Girls Home.

Among the important topics to be discussed is medical care of the indigent, a matter which has assumed added importance because of the proposed national health program recently set forth at the National Health Conference in Washington. The Diocesan Director of Catholic Charities will give an exciting report on this one consideration. Dr. L. B. Falk of the Social Security Board will explain details of the program, and the Most Rev. Charles Hubert Lehond, Bishop of St. Joseph and Honorary President of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, will discuss the implications of the program from the point of view of Catholic Charities.

One of the main topics of the Committee on Health will discuss recent developments in group insurance programs. Frank Van Dyk, Executive Director of the Associated Hospital Services, New York, will lead this discussion on hospital group insurance. Another meeting of the Committee on Health will discuss the extent to which cities and counties now component Catholic Charities are caring for the indigent sick.

Meetings of Directors
There will be two meetings of the Diocesan Directors of Catholic Charities on Friday, October 7, to discuss "The Personal Work of the Director in the Catholic Charities Office" and the "Present Status of Volunteer Programs in Diocesan Organizations of Catholic Charities." There will be no meeting that same day of chaplains of parochial institutions and a dinner meeting of the executive committee of the Conference will be held.

The Public Relations of the Diocesan Organization of Catholic Charities is the topic of a program Saturday morning, October 8, when distinguished figures in the Catholic and secular newspaper fields will address the diocesan directors.

Care for Mentally Handicapped Children will be the topic of a four-day meeting that morning. A meeting of the Conference of Religious Sisters, K. Golden and Mother Mary of St. Denis, House of food Shepherd, Detroit, will discuss "Recent Trends." The Rt. Rev. Marg. Edward Flanagan, Director of Father Flanagan's Boys' Home, will speak on "Institutional Work with Behavior Problem Boys," and Sister Mary Pauline of the College of St. Elizabeth Convent Station, N. J., will talk on "Institution of Normal Children for Behavior Problem Children."

There will be an Institute for Women Volunteers that afternoon, followed by a dinner meeting of diocesan directors, October 7, to discuss "The Present Status of Catholic Charities."

His Excellency the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, will be celebrant of the Solemn Pontifical Mass with which the meeting will be formally opened Sunday morning, October 8, in the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

The Most Rev. Peter L. Iretton, Coadjutor Bishop and Administrator of the Diocese of Richmond, will preach the sermon.
