### K. C. PILGRIMAGE TO MARTYRS SHRINE

To Attract Many From Diocese

Interest among Knights of Columbus throughout the diocese is growing for the first pilgrimage to Asheville, N. C., scene of the martyrdom of the famous Jesuit Martyr-Saints, to be sponsored by the State Council, K. of C. and Order of the Alhambra on Sunday, October 9.

The pilgrimage will include members of the Knights of Columbus, the Alhambra, families and friends. It is of interest in the diocese as being shown by the pilgrimage also by the Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women.

Grand Knight Leo F. Romabault of Rochester Council has named Dr. James N. Shannon, chairman of the Catholic Activities Committee to be in charge of the Rochester Council delegation. Grand Knight Cornelius J. Toney of Geneva Council is speaking arrangements for knights in this council.

Grand Commander Gus A. Shula has appointed Carl J. Schenck as chairman of the Men Caravan, Order of the Alhambra delegation. Reduced fares have been authorized from principal stations by the New York Central Railroad and special trains will be operated, leaving Rochester at 11:2 A. M. and Newark at 7:52 A. M. and returning at 9:10 P. M., making stops at the principal stations. The round-trip fare from Rochester is \$4.50. Tickets may be procured at the Rochester Consolidated Ticket Office, 34 Exchange Street, Niagara Falls, N. Y.

George A. Timony, Chairman of the Catholic Activities Committee, in charge of arrangements, announced that representatives from almost all the councils in the state will join the pilgrimage. At 11:00 Noon on Sunday, October 9, the pilgrims will proceed from the special trains arriving at Asheville, N. C., to the Shrine of the Holy Martyrs. The Shrine of the Holy Martyrs will be opened by the Rev. James J. Bohan, S. J., the pastor of the Shrine of the Holy Martyrs.

After luncheon the pilgrims will be followed by a solemn procession of the Shrine of the Holy Martyrs. The Shrine of the Holy Martyrs will be addressed by State Deputy Joseph F. It is the Shrine of the Holy Martyrs, where the first Mass was celebrated on October 15, 1565, by the great American Martyr, St. Isaac Jogues, S. J., at the hands of the Iroquois Indians to whose salvation he had devoted his priestly life.

The other Martyrs suffering a similar fate, whose memory the Shrine perpetuates, are Fathers Jean de Brebeuf, S. J., Gabriel Lallemant, S. J., Antoine Daniel, S. J., Charles Garnier, S. J., and two lay brothers of the Society of the Holy Martyrs, St. Jean de Lande.

Another honored at Asheville is Catherine Tekakwitha, an Indian maiden who, through her holiness, has become known as the "Lily of the Mohawks."

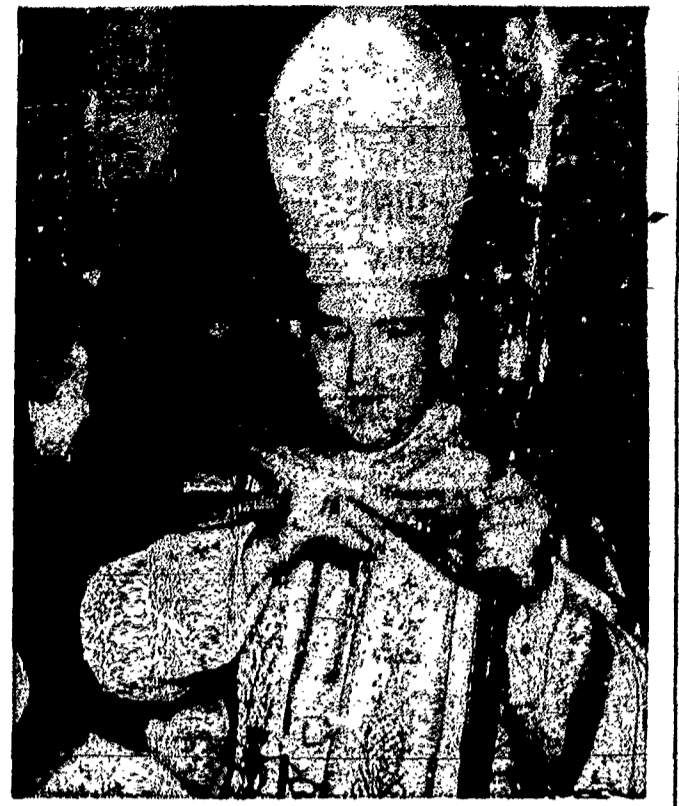

Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, addressing the faculty and students of the College of Mount St. Vincent during the Mass of the Holy Ghost, which solemnly closed the scholastic year, declared that religion is the center of the educational system upon which the college is based.

### NEW SCHOOL WING AT SACRED HEART

Dedicated By Bishop Kearney

Upholding the merit of Catholic education, His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, stressed its superiority in the world today, as he dedicated the new wing of the Sacred Heart Academy, last Thursday afternoon.

About three hundred people were present for the colorful ceremony including parents, friends and clergy. The new wing now furnishes the school with much additional room. Under the guidance of the Rev. Edward Magner, one hundred pupils will be given thorough education, at this school conducted by the Religious of the Sacred Heart.

The new wing is three stories high and connected to the old by a modern entrance. It has a modern mother recreation hall, well equipped with ping-pong tables, lounges and a radio. The second floor has seven new classrooms with new desks and excellent lighting. On the third floor is the assembly hall with a stage, capable of seating over three hundred people.

Assisting the Bishop were the Rev. Messrs. William F. Bergan, Chancellor of the Diocese, and the Very Rev. Edward Magner, Rector of the Sacred Heart Academy. Among the clergy present were the Rev. Messrs. William Hart, V.G., the Rev. John M. Duffy, Superintendent of Schools, the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, the Rev. Edward Magner, the Rev. Edward Bergan, the Rev. Frederick Nantogel, C.S.B., the Rev. John Lynch, C.S.B., and the Rev. John M. O'Leary, C.S.B.

Bishop Kearney likened Catholic education to a priceless pearl. It is well worth the sacrifice necessary to attain it. The school, he said, is really a sacrifice. First of all, the parents must plan long in advance so that the child may be properly educated. Second, the religious must give over their lives to the work of teaching.

The old system of education alone can give culture, character, purity of heart and speech. It is all the same lesson that Christ himself taught as he walked about with his disciples. The aim of this school is to preserve that teaching from one generation to another and to prepare students not only for life but for life hereafter. The true worth of this education cannot be appreciated, not even by those who have been graduates long ago.

The blessing of this new wing means progress and gives these students every opportunity to develop themselves, attractive in the light of God, the Bishop said.

In blessing this new addition to Sacred Heart Academy, we could express no better wish than that its history in accomplishments of young women be as magnificent as the light of God in the old school which it is annexed.
