Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, in addressing the opening session of the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

'DEMONSTRATION OF UNITY OF FAITH' Is True Meaning Of Congress Oct. 17

"A demonstration of the unity of faith among Catholics, especially of their faith in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist" is how the Most Rev. Joseph F. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans sees the forthcoming National Eucharistic Congress opening in this city Monday, October 17 and continuing to Thursday.

Rochester will be represented at the great demonstration of faith in the Louisiana city by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, the Rt. Rev. Magr. Charles E. Shady, the Rev. Lawrence E. Casey and the Rev. John Newcomb of Hornell.

Catholic women's organizations of the diocese will be represented by Miss Cecilia M. Yawman, President, Rochester Diocesan Council, N. C. W. Mrs. Teresa Gantner, national president, Knights of St. John Auxiliaries, and Mrs. George Gurniot, President, Catholic Women's Club.

National Communion Day Sunday, October 16 will be National Communion Sunday for the welfare and intentions of the Holy Father.

His Eminence, George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago and Papal Legate will be received officially at noon, Monday, October 17.

Solemn Pontifical Mass celebrated by Cardinal Mundelein in the "Open Air Cathedral" in the New Orleans City Park Stadium on Tuesday morning will formally open the Congress.

Wednesday will be Youth Day with appropriate religious exercises. A holiday has been declared for the closing day of the Congress on Thursday by the Holy Father. The Mass will be held at 10 o'clock in the morning. It is called the Congress as a magnificent occasion for raising to new heights our spiritual aspirations and civic pride.

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Such lofty aims are of supreme value to all, regardless of creed. Plans are near completion for the annual charitable procession which will be held on Wednesday afternoon, October 20, closing day of the Congress.

The procession will be in seven divisions: Pilgrims and guests, Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus service units, Scouting units, a Clergy Division, men and women from all parts of the United States will be in line.

19 Bishops Attend Truth Society Meeting

LONDON—Nineteen Bishops, including His Eminence Arch-bishop Cardinal Hinsley, took part in the Catholic Truth Society conference at Brighton on the coast, the first of a new series.

Before the world war, C. T. S. held an annual conference which was the most important event of the normal year. Later this became the National Catholic Congress which was at first held annually, then triennially, and has now lapsed.

MAYOR OFFICIATES AS NEW STORE For Bond Clothes Opens To Public

Cleaning houses and plate glass doors of the new, larger home of Bond Cloth's swung open today at 133-137 East Main, where a large staff is ready to outfit the men from head to foot in Rochester. Mayor E. Rapp presided Thursday at ribbon-cutting ceremonies, in which company officials from New York and Rochester will participate at 8:45 A. M. at the last Mass service.

Located on the site of the old Odenbach Restaurant and adjacent building, the new store covers four times the area in the present store and includes men's furnishings and shoe departments never before offered in Bond stores here. The building fronts on both Main Street and South Avenue.

Employ Rochesterians Local contractors working under the general direction of American Iron and Steel Equipment Company, have handled all construction which included the demolition of old structures last July 15. A total of 80 Rochesterians will be employed regularly after the three-day opening celebration. The store will be open until 9 P. M. today, Friday and Saturday.

Outside trim of the building is of Bedford stone and black marble. A mosaic tile picture of the latter Bond Clothing factory is imbedded in the facade facing a Main Street. A 30-foot upright sign fronts on South Avenue.

That the furnishings are in bronze-framed glass cases on the main floor. The men's clothing department extends from South Avenue to Minerva Place on the main floor. Outer shoe department and the college shop are on the mezzanine. A marble staircase leads from the ground floor to the mezzanine.
