HOLY FAMILY SCORES 19-6 Triumph Over Syracuse Eleven

The Purple and Gold Cyclone of Holy Family High School chalked up a second gridiron victory over season Saturday afternoon when it drubbed a stubborn St. Anthony of Padua of Syracuse 19-6 in the opening home game of the season played at Fairview Park in Auburn. Early in the first period Quarterback George Tonz called for the pass play. The ball was snapped to fullback Jack Behan, who hit get up in the line and handed the ball to Tonz, who faked back and tossed a 30-yard pass to Joe Simpson, left end, for the initial six points of the game. The Purple and Gold gridiron pushed across another touchdown before the first period ended when Tonz and Behan on long runs put the ball in play on the "Saints" 15-yard line. On an off-tackle play, Tonz netted the second tally of the game. Both times John Synnot's attempt to convert after the score failed. The Flynnmen carried the ball to the visitors' six-inch line in the third stanza only to lose it to home. St. Anthony, with its backs on the wall, instead of kicking out of danger, took to the air. A series of completed passes down the field on the pigskin on the Holy Family six-yard stripe. Harry Coon, fullback, crashed the line for the first touchdown when Tonz scored since the sport was introduced in the parochial school in Syracuse. Holy Family scored again in the fourth quarter on a long pass. Synnot converted.
