 CLYDE. — When the Most Rev. James Kearney, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, comes to Clyde on October 30 to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation, he will find among those to be confirmed a convert who had played the organ in the Episcopal Church for seventy-two years.

A few weeks ago, I went over to bid farewell to Mrs. Sarah Hamilton who was preparing to leave Clyde for St. Ann's Home in Rochester. Although eighty-six years old, I found her working hard, packing her worldly possessions in preparation for her trip. As I walked over to sit down for a few minutes, I noticed a book on the chair — it was the Life of Christ by the Rev. Father O'Sullivan. I had been talking to this kindly, old lady. I was deeply touched by the simple and peaceful life she had spent. Replied Mrs. Hamilton:

She had lived all her life in Clyde or its vicinity with the exception of eight years spent in Denver, Colorado. Baptized in the Methodist Church as a child, Mrs. Hamilton found her way into the Episcopal Church at the age of fourteen. It was at this early age that she began playing the organ. She was, however, and rightly so, told she was absent for 18 years without being absent for any service; a record of which anyone could be rightly proud.

It was while she was in Denver, Colorado, that Mrs. Hamilton began to admire the Catholic Church. There were two contributing causes at this time. First, she became acquainted with a High Church Episcopalian whose liturgy and music she admired and secondly a good example of two school teachers from Boston Massachusetts who, themselves were recent converts. This experience in the High Church, she related, "Brought me one step closer to the true Church, for I then began to read and study the society of the Church of Rome." As for the assistance and leadership of these two women whose lives she admired, she said, "Mrs. Hamilton told me, she would ever be grateful to God."

 During the past forty years Mrs. Hamilton had visited St. John's whenever Special Devotions were held, but it was only in May of this year that she resigned as organist in the Episcopal Church and began her instruction in the Catholic faith. After being duly prepared by Father Curtin and Father Cuddy, Mrs. Hamilton was received into the Church on July 4th.

It has been her privilege to know this kindly, old lady only a few months, but her courage, her simplicity, her simplicity will be a happy recollection. She returns to Clyde to be confirmed, she returns to the Church, where she was baptized and received her first Holy Communion. She will leave Clyde, a mother of Jesus Christ, with the blessing of her bishop tingling in her ears "May the Lord bless you out of Zion, the good things of Jerusalem all the days of your life and have life everlasting."

Birth Control Law Violators Pay Fines

LAVERGNE, MASS.—Fines were written to the so-called Massachusetts Birth Prevention Case, yesterday, when four women, convicted of distributing birth prevention literature, were fined \$100 each in Superior Criminal Court.

They had carried their fight unsuccessfully through the courts of the State and had appealed to the United States Supreme Court but the nation's highest tribunal this week sustained the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court.

The women, Mrs. Carolyn T. Gardner, of Salem; Dr. Lucille Lord Hilsenstein, of Boston; Mrs. Flora Ruch, of Brookline, and Mrs. Pamela Ferris, of Marblehead, were arrested when the North Shore Mothers' Health Office was raided.
