Public Can Help Fight Crime

ELMIRA — Public opinion of vital importance in fighting crime, Patrolman Richard J. Conroy, Jr., told St. Patrick's Holy Name Society at the last meeting.

"The public must be educated in crime data so that the law enforcement agencies will receive the proper cooperation in their activities," he declared.

Crime costs \$10 per capita monthly in the United States, the speaker asserted.

With 4,500,000 active criminals in this country the cost last year was \$15 billion dollars. One crime is committed every four seconds and one homicide every four minutes totaling approximately 14 million crimes annually. Crime claims 1000 youths under 21 years annually.

Urging voluntary civil fingerprinting, Patrolman Conroy described methods of scientific crime prevention and detection he recently studied at the Federal Bureau of Investigation School at Washington.

5,500 Make Trip To Auriesville

AURIESVILLE, N. Y. — Under the sponsorship of the State Council of the Knights of Columbus and the Order of Alhambra, more than 5,500 people journeyed here last Sunday, October 16th in the first organized state-wide pilgrimage to the Shrine of the North American Martyrs, the burial places of Church heroes slain by Indians nearly 200 years ago.

The pilgrims came from New York, Buffalo, Rochester, Albany and other cities and towns, by automobile and special train.

They took part in a full day of religious observances, including a Mass celebrated by the Right Rev. Edward Magin, Vicar General of the Albany Diocese, at which the Rev. James J. Rohan, S.J., Director of the Shrine, preached the sermon.

The Right Rev. J. Francis A. McIntyre, Chancellor of the Archdiocese of New York, preached at the Benediction services which were held in the ravine in which St. Rene Goupil, another of the martyred Jesuits, is buried. Prayers for Peace Forbidden In Russia

MOSCOW — The Ministry for Public Worship and Education of the Home Office of the OGPU has forbidden the saying of special prayers for world peace throughout the Soviet domain. Such prayers, it was said, would tend to increase religious fanaticism among the millions of Russia's population. The number of church services now being held, the order stated, should not be increased.
