RADIO SPEAKER TERMS ROSARY
Spiritual Solution For All Suffering

CHICAGO. — The Rosary is a spiritual solution of the problem of suffering, the Very Rev. Dr. J. J. McLaughlin, O. P., President of Aquinas College, Columbus, O., said Sunday in the second of three discourses he is giving in the "Catholic Hour."

The "Catholic Hour" is produced by the National Council of Catholic Men and is broadcast over a national-wide network of the National Broadcasting Company, Sunday's program originated in Station WMAQ, here. Dr. McLaughlin was assisted by the Speech Choir of Rosary College, River Forest, Ill. The Choral Society of St. Mary's Church, Evanston, Ill., sang.

Dr. McLaughlin, whose general theme is "The Rosary and the Rights of Man," spoke Sunday on "Liberty," projecting his remarks against the background of the five sorrowful mysteries of the Rosary. "The suffering we have witnessed," said Dr. McLaughlin, "confronts the consideration of these mysteries, cannot be explained unless we remember that God has chosen to bring us through a vale of tears to our true country, where He will wash out the stains of our sad and sorrowful humanity, suffering as the fact of life. It is not a book of medicine, and therefore, it does not offer a medical remedy. It is not a civil code, and therefore, it does not offer a legal remedy. It is not a political program, and therefore, it does not offer a political remedy. It is a spiritual solution of the problem of suffering, a solution which will be found in the scene which is about to appear."

"Meanwhile we may consider that no man or woman is free from some form of suffering. There is no liberty from inevitable pain; for if the body of one can escape the pain of death, it still is certain to encounter. But there is liberty in suffering if our souls are released from worldly considerations. There is liberty to live deeply and well in a suffering body, if we accept of the kingdom of heaven. This is the liberty of men and this is the law of God. This is the explanation of suffering; and if we do not accept it, there is no way out of our agonies for we make them eternal."

Common-Sense Prayer
"The most holy Rosary is a common-sense prayer. It admits the combined and simultaneous action of the mind and the voice. By its very nature, it rules out lip service to the Lord and demands the service of the soul. Our Lady, Mother, Mary, gave it to all who would accept it for the benefit of all. It has brought blessings to the world. The homes of those who recite the Rosary daily as a family prayer will bear witness to that. It has brought victory in battle, as we know from the history of the great battle of Lepanto, at which Don John of Austria led the Christian fleet to the crushing defeat of the Moslem horde. It has brought solace and peace in suffering and death, as countless doctors, nurses and priests may attest. It teaches lessons for everyone, lessons which are useful in every problem which ever it may be."

SAYS PARENTS ONLY, NOT LAW, MUST Revive Nation's Family Life
WASHINGTON. — A warning that law cannot correct every evil, and that family life can be restored only through parents accepting their proper responsibilities, is sounded by the Very Rev. Robert J. White, Dean of the Law School of the Catholic University of America, in an article in the October issue of National Parent-Teacher.

"The law has done much, and we live in an age in which the law affecting the family directly — indirectly are multiplying fast," says Dr. White, who was formerly assistant district attorney of Middlesex County, Massachusetts. One of the great popular American errors is the childish belief that a law can remedy every evil and bring about model conditions. Law has limits.

"Laws have accomplished much and can do still more. But laws have definite, and very definite, limits as a regulatory force in society. Parents and teachers alike recognize the difficulties experienced in laws lacking in inner respect, control, and stability. Parents which do not furnish their children with satisfying affectional relationships. For this lack of inherent solidity the law has no remedy. This is a defect which only parents themselves can remedy, realization of the paradox which threatens the family and through assuming the measures which they themselves must work out.

"The restoration of the family life — inner and satisfying family relationships — can come only through an acceptance by parents of the fundamental principle that marriage is not a joint pleasure but a serious and worthy responsibility for the paradox holds true in marriage that sacrifice — as strangely unfashionable as it seems — is the condition of marital happiness. The law can only be effective to stop dangerous abuses which threaten society."
