Pope Congratulates
Tertiaries on Work

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 3.—Receiving a
delegation of English Franciscan
Tertiaries, who presented an ad-
dress of condolence over the re-
cent congress of atheists in Lon-
don, which was termed an offense
against Catholics and against all
good persons, who deplored the
disgraceful event, His Holiness
Pope Pius XI congratulated the
Tertiaries on the redoubled fervor
they had shown in acts of repara-
tion and expressed the wish that
their acts would be good and
always more abundant fruit.
The Holy Father concluded by
saying that his thanks be conveyed
to the British sovereign, who,
in his recent hours of suffering,
showed kindly interest in his
health.

Receives Papal Honor

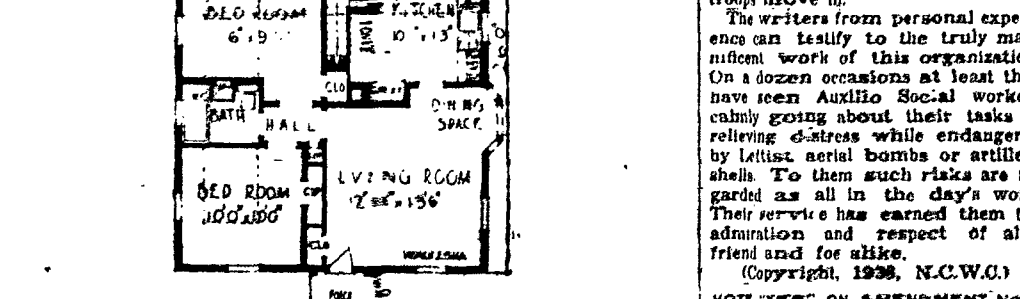
JAMAICA, N. Y. At the request
