BISHOP KEARNEY ATTENDS COMMUNION

Breakfast of Auburn Knights of Columbus

AUBURN - More than 200 members of the local Council of Knights of Columbus met at their home in Genesee Street on Sunday morning from where they proceeded to attend the 7:30 o'clock Mass at St. Aloysius Church which was celebrated by the Most Reverend James E. Kearney, Bishop of the Rochester Diocese.

After the Mass, the Knights journeyed to the Osborne Hotel for their annual Communion Breakfast. At the breakfast introductory remarks were made by Grand Knight T. Joseph Coffey, who then turned over the program to J. Joseph Boyle, co-contractor.

The guest of the morning, Bishop Kearney spoke briefly to the Knights, urging them to carry on with vigor the precepts of the Order. It was particularly significant that the Bishop should draw a beautiful picture showing the parallel between the Knights of old with whom we always associate a King, and the Knights of today.

Brief remarks were also given by Rt. Rev. Magr. William F. Bergan, Chancellor of the Diocese, Rev. Dr. William E. Cowan, Rev. Walter A. Fischer, and John J. Leo, Knight and past district deputy.

A short, delightful program of vocal solos were rendered by Miss Eileen Kelly, young talented Auburnian.

After the breakfast Bishop Kearney accompanied by Magr. Bergan visited a class of 125 in St. John's Church of which the Rev. Joseph J. Kelly is pastor.

At 3:30 Bishop Kearney confirmed 140 at St. Hyacinth's Church, as stated by the Rev. Jerome Holowick, pastor.

The sacrament was administered to the class of 125 at 8 o'clock in St. Alphonse's Church.
