## CARD. MUNDELEIN IN VATICAN CITY IS ACCORDED MANY HIGH HONORS

VATICAN CITY (NC-Radio)—Signal and impressive receptions both at Naples and at Rome, a long private audience with His Holiness Pope Pius XI, and prominent participation in the solemn beatification were the successive experiences of His Eminence Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, over the week-end.

Cardinal Mundelein came here to report to the Holy Father on the Eighth National Eucharistic Congress in the United States, held at New Orleans last month and to which he was named Legate under the patronage of the audience accorded him by his holiness last Sunday.

His Eminence also came here to participate in the solemn Mass for St. Francis Xavier Cabrini who died in 1917 and at whose feast the Cardinal celebrated last Sunday. Cardinal Mundelein took part in ceremonies attending the beatification of Maria Josephine Rossello, Foundress of the Daughters of Our Lady of Mercy, as a senior Cardinal present, belonging to the Order of Priests, the Archbishop of Chicago presented the incense to Pope Pius XI when the Sovereign Pontiff had come down to the Vatican Basilica to venerate the new Beata for the first time.

Cardinal Mundelein is staying at the Collegio Santa Maria del Lago (Saint Mary of the Lake College), which the Archdiocese of Chicago maintains for the education of priests in the Eternal City. Cardinal Mundelein told the N.C.W.C. News Service that he was deeply impressed by the honors which Italian authorities rendered him on his arrival here as a Papal representative.

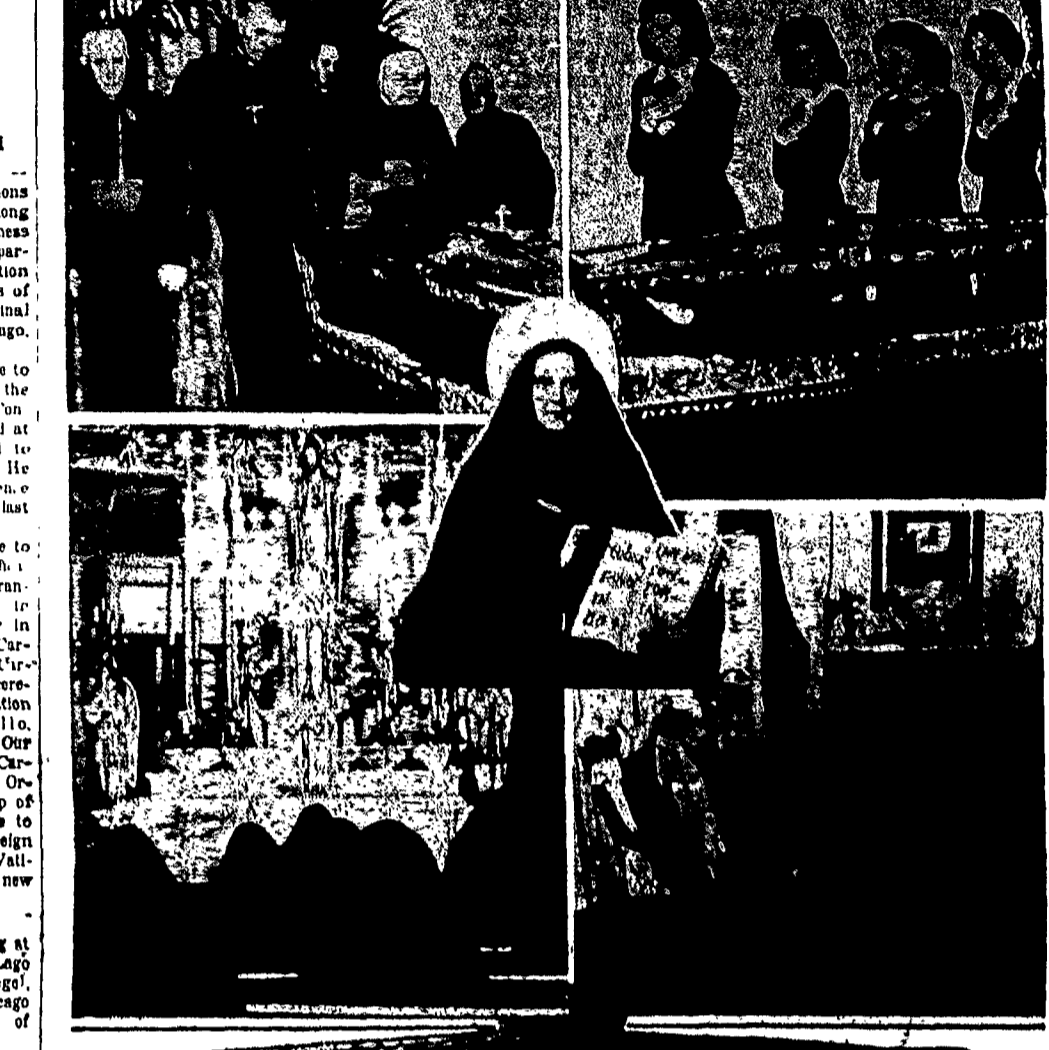
He is grateful to President Roosevelt, at whose invitation on the United States Ambassador personally greeted him upon his arrival in Italy and brought him to Rome by special train. Cardinal Mundelein also said that His Eminence recalled with particular satisfaction his long and friendly meeting with President Roosevelt, whom he has known since before the President of the United States was Governor of New York. He was touched too, the Cardinal added, by the courtesy of the Commander of the United States naval forces in European waters, who was his host at luncheon aboard the U.S.S. Omaha on Saturday.

Recalling his audience with the Holy Father, Cardinal Mundelein said it was a source of delight to him to be able to bring to the Sovereign Pontiff the comforting good news of the magnificent success of the Eucharistic Congress in New Orleans.

Likewise, Cardinal Mundelein continued, it is a source of happiness to him to be able to take part in the solemn beatification of Mother Cabrini next Sunday. Mother Cabrini was not only a great native of Italy, but a great citizen of the United States, he said.

Cardinal Mundelein recalled with words of sorrow the death of Patrick Cardinal Hayes of New York, his former schoolmate at whose funeral he recently officiated. Greeted by J. S. O'Connell, when the Italian liner Rex came to dock at Naples shortly after noon on Saturday, an impressive group of dignitaries went aboard to welcome Cardinal Mundelein. ## Mother Cabrini Rites Marked By Rare Events

CHICAGO (NC).—Three unusual events will mark the beatification of the Foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, the Venerable Mother Cabrini.

It will be the first time on record that a Cardinal who officiated at the funeral of a candidate for sainthood also officiated at the beatification in St. Peter's. This distinction belongs to His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, who presided at the first ecclesiastical inquiry held at Columbus hospital, Chicago, September, 1923. Cardinal Mundelein is in Rome to take part in the solemn ceremony at St. Peter's November 13 when the Holy Father will declare Mother Cabrini Blessed.

Secondly it is the first time that a beatification has followed so closely after the death of a candidate for sainthood. The body of Mother Cabrini was found preserved; so decomposition had not set in. A new hall was put on the venerable body, precious relics were taken and the body, in a wooden casket, was placed within a bronze shroud. This was sealed with the seal of the Cardinal of Chicago, New York and the body was interred October 8, 1923, in a shrine in the chapel of the Mother Cabrini High School in New York City.

## Leaders Grateful For Aid In Guaranteeing Justice

Evidencing their determination that justice shall at last be done all children in the State, a majority of nearly 200,000 voters on Tuesday gave approval to writing into the Constitution amendments which among other measures provide for the transportation for all children where needed.

Figures obtainable Thursday morning, just before noon, showed that Amendment Number 1 was carried by 230,477 votes in favor with 1,143,222 votes against. George A. Timon, Chairman of the Catholic Affairs Committee of the Knights of Columbus, New York, protested to James Mariani, President of the Board of Education, on behalf of over 20,000 members of the City of New York, the majority of whom are Catholics.

## FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF Bishop Occurs On Armistice Day

## Cooperative Plan Banishes Relief

## YOUTH POSING AS PRIEST JAILED IN NEW ORLEANS

He came to New Orleans from Houston, he said, and had collected 62 cents from three women from whom he solicited money for the Society of the Propagation of the Faith. He had been staying before his arrest at the Baptist Bible Mission here. Two sacred vessels, additional vestments and a dozen rosaries were found in his room.
