Mother Cabrini's Beatification

Although not of us may have some particular Saint to whom is shown special devotion, all American citizens can share their thoughts with pride Sunday to the Vatican where Mother Cabrini will be solemnly beatified by His Holiness, Pius XI. It is true that Mother Francis Xavier Cabrini was not native born but she became a citizen of the United States and died on her great work especially at Columbus Hospital, Chicago, where she died a little over twenty years ago in December, 1917. Beatification from the Latin, beatus (blessed) and sacro (sacred) is the declaration by the Holy Father as head of the Church that one of its members deserves for saintly virtues a canon or heroic death, to be entitled to that regard as dwelling in the happiness of heaven. Mother Cabrini was foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart and her life was marked by great charity. Miracles attributed to her intercession have been attested to.

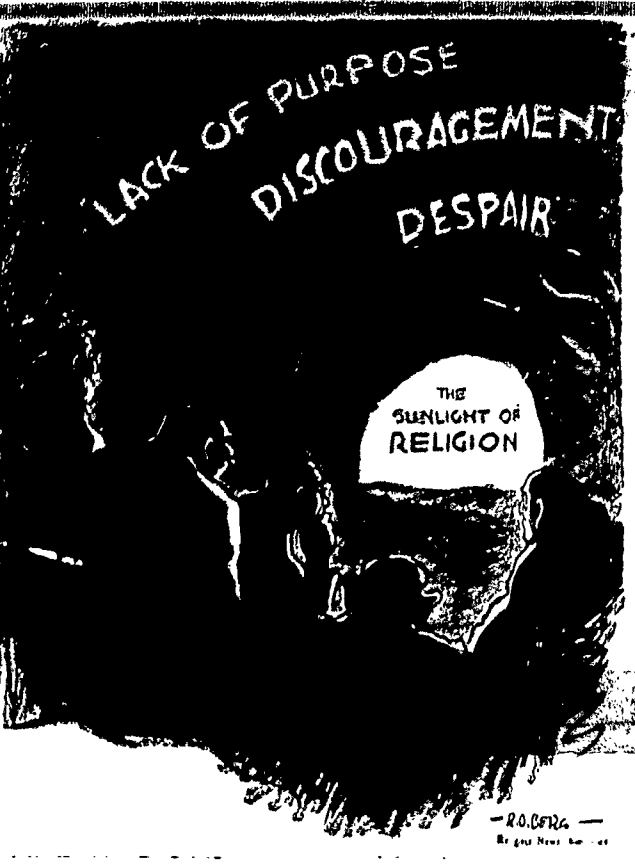
Ireland Again
