

# Rochester Welcomes 200 Lay Retreatants

## DELEGATES HERE FOR REGIONAL MEET To Hear Magr. Sheen At Dinner Saturday

Regional clergy and laymen from several sections of the United States will converge on Rochester (Friday) for the first regional conference of the National Laymen's Retreat League, to be held Saturday and Sunday in Columbus Civic Center.

Attendance at the retreat movement will be increased by more than 200 delegates from 10 dioceses surrounding Rochester, according to Charles A. Tucker, president of the Rochester Laymen's Retreat League and general chairman.

Highlighting the program will be a banquet Saturday at 7:30 p. m. at the Columbus Civic Center, which will be presided over by Rt. Rev. Magr. J. Sheen, author, orator and associate professor at the Catholic University of America in Washington.

## C. Y. A. WORKERS Make Final Drive To Surpass Goal

The 1938 membership drive of the Columbus Youth Association is in the home stretch with 400 workers aiming at an "over the top" report for the final meeting Monday evening.

An announcement was made today that the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, honorary campaign chairman, will speak at the closing dinner.

Just one year ago almost to the day, Bishop Kearney made his first public appearance following his installation by addressing the workers in the 1937 C. Y. A. membership drive.

The campaign opened last Thursday evening with 150 workers. Rev. Walter A. Foery, Bishop of Syracuse, addressed the workers. Bishop Foery came here on the invitation of the Rev. Gerald T. Lambert, his successor as head of the Columbus Charities and Director of the Columbus Civic Center.

Campaign workers face a busy week in order to reach their goal of 400 workers.

At the first report meeting Monday evening the campaigners reported a total of 331 memberships for 234 per cent of the goal. The women's division, led by Mrs. Lawrence L. Dolinger, reports 125 memberships for 19.8 per cent of its quota, while the men's division under George B. McAvoy had 146 memberships for 19.7 per cent of its quota.

The special committee chairmanship of Edward J. Doyle turned in a whopping total of 260 memberships at this first report meeting to equal the total to 331.

High team honors for the first report night went to the Kodak team captained by John C. Doyle which reported 53 memberships for 18.4 per cent of its quota.

The second report meeting of the drive is scheduled for this evening with S. Wirt Wiley, retiring secretary of the C. Y. A., listed as the principal speaker.

Octo A. Shulist, general chairman of the campaign, is expected to preside at tonight's dinner meeting.
