Inspired by the threat of an unbalanced season's record, Aquinas smashed to a 7-6 victory over the hitherto undefeated St. Joseph's team of Buffalo, at Edgerton Park Paddock, Saturday.

Inability of the Collegian backs to hang onto the ball at critical times called the Maroon juggernaut. But nothing can be taken from the white-jeried Irish for their ability to cash in on the break that came their way. The old axiom that a great team makes its own breaks still holds true. A hard charging line and an alert team snatched up the Saints' fumbles; and they still pay off on the scoreboard.

For Aquinas Bob Holenstein, a good halfback all season, became a great back Saturday with his fiery sparkling runs, scored the Irish touchdown and shared back-carrying honors with Bill McCarthy, the St. Joe quarterback. Maximizing a season of steady head-up football the Aquinas stalwarts Maggio at center and Frankunas and Terlicak at the tackles turned in another standout performance.

The punting for the only time during the season was well above par with Ed Holenstein and Herb Bauer knocking the Bison's back on their heels with long well-placed punts. Bernie Gallagher's extra point placement however must stand as the most important Aquinas back of the game, for it was this score which decided the ball game.

After reviewing the Aquinas football season it would seem that the charge of a poor season at the Dewey Avenue school is not a well founded one. True, other Irish teams have established better records, but it is questionable whether any other Aquinas team faced as stiff a schedule opening with Cook Academy. The Irish dropped a one point decision after a weird official ruling. Poor punting on the part of the Irish backs and the starting play of Lynch and Kennedy probably the best pair of wingmen to show against the Maroon all season, marked the season's opener. Then followed the game with iron-cladness which the Irish took a decisive 24-13 win from one of the best high school teams in this vicinity. Steamrolling a good Hobart Fresh team, 24-0, Aquinas was then stopped cold 0-26 by the Niagara Fresh, who showed the best drilled team to face the Irish this year and few high school teams could have held the charge of the Eagles.

C. B. A. took a fall out of the Sullivan's with a smothering 19-0 victory, but they bounced back to slaughter a stubborn St. Mary's (Niagara Falls) team 22-0.

Winding up with the St. Joe victory a team until this game undefeated, gave Aquinas a record of 4 wins against 3 losses. Not a great season for the record books, but still not the worst in Irish history.

The large crowd which turned out to witness the closing of the season showed the coaching of Johnny Sullivan and the brand of ball the Irish showed throughout the season. Here, top a palm and much deserved praise must be given to the Aquinas band which put on a great show at every game. Tricky formations and intricate marching routines were carried out with swiftness and precision.
