CARDINAL PACELLI GIVES ABSOLUTION For Mrs. Macaulay, Noted Laywoman

VATICAN CITY, (NC). — After receiving reassuring news concerning the condition of His Holiness Pope Pius XI, His Eminence Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State, left the Vatican Saturday morning and went to the Church of the Gesù in Rome to give absolution at the funeral of Mrs. William J. Babington Macaulay, wife of the Irish Minister to the Holy See.

Mrs. Macaulay, who was formerly Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, of New York, was a Papal Duchess. She died at noon Thursday of a blood infection, following an illness of a few days.

Archbishop Giuseppe Migone, Secret Almoner of His Holiness, was celebrant of the solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem this morning. He was assisted by the Rt. Rev. Mons. Michel Curran, Rector of the Irish College in Rome, the Rt. Rev. Mons. Joseph P. Hurley, American priest attached to the Papal Secretariat of State, and Mons. Giuseppe Gatti, Canon of the congregation of the Holy Order.

Mrs. Macaulay was buried temporarily in a tomb in the Capuchin Cemetery in Rome. Her remains are to be taken to Waukegan, Ill., by Mr. Macaulay. There they will be interred in the Mausoleum of the late Mrs. Macaulay, beside the remains of her first husband, Mr. Brady, who was a Papal Duke.

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NEW YORK (NC). — Members of her family and friends attended a solemn Pontifical Mass for the repose of the soul of Mrs. William J. Babington Macaulay, wife of the Irish Minister to the Vatican, which was celebrated at the Church of the Holy Spirit, 101 Eastland Avenue, New York, on Sunday, December 4.

Mrs. Macaulay was married to William J. Babington Macaulay March 6, 1897. She resided with her husband in the home of the late Mrs. Macaulay, 101 Eastland Avenue, from time to time to carry on her many interests there.

She was a member of the World Committee of the Girl Scouts and continued to serve as Chairman of the Board of the Girl Scouts of America, to which she made many contributions, until her death. She was also Chairman of the Board of the Catholic Club, of New York which she founded in memory of her mother, a member of the Social Service Committee for the City Hospital at Welfare Island, New York for 32 years, making large contributions in that connection.

Mrs. Macaulay was a Papal Duchess and held high honors in the Catholic Church. She also bore honorary degrees from Georgetown University and the University of Notre Dame. She received the Loretto Medal from Notre Dame, awarded annually to an outstanding Catholic layman in the United States.

Mrs. Macaulay was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Garvey of Hartford, Conn. She was married to the late Nicholas F. Brady in 1906. Mr. Brady was a Papal Duke and an outstanding Catholic layman in the United States and was a director in nearly 50 corporations at the time of his death in March, 1930.

Under Mr. Brady's will Mrs. Macaulay was the sole beneficiary of his estate, which amounted to approximately \$22,000,000. Since that time she has made many contributions to charitable institutions, notably Catholic. One of her most recent benefactions was the donation of her estate, situated at Manhattan, N. Y., to the Society of Jesus for a house of studies. She also was the benefactor of the Jesuit Novitiate of St. Isaac Jogues, at Waukegan, Ill.

Mrs. Macaulay is survived by her husband, two sisters, Mrs. John Cavanagh, of Norwalk, Conn., and Mother Angelina, of St. Joseph's College, West Hartford, Conn., and a nephew, John Garvan, of Hartford, Conn. She was survived by a nephew, James C. Brady, four nieces, Mrs. Frederick S. Moseley, Mrs. Michael Scott, Mrs. John Coughlin, and Mrs. Anderson Fowler, all of Peapack, N. J.
