

HOME MISSIONS GET OVER \$500,000

Bishops Learn At Extension Meeting

CHICAGO (NC) - The Catholic Church Extension Society distributed approximately a half million dollars in meeting the various needs of the Home Missions in the course of the year ending October 31, the Most Rev. William D. O'Brien, Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago and President of the Extension Society reported at the thirty-third annual meeting of the Society held here Tuesday.

The report stated that 75 mission hospitals and parish buildings costing from \$3,000 to \$50,000 were built or repaired with the help of the Society and for the work, the Bishop said, nearly \$1,000,000 was disbursed in 39 dioceses. Nearly \$500,000 was sent out for monthly subsidies to priests in isolated districts.

SPAIN Today and Tomorrow

Another controversial question about Spain is the Spanish Nationalist Government fascistism. It is discussed in the article by Dr. Joseph V. Thorning and John V. Hinkel. Three other articles by them, in the New Spain being established by the Nationalists and the third on the future of that country, will conclude their present series. They have just finished a visit to Nationalist Spain.

BURGOS, SPAIN - That much-abused term, "fascist," has been pinned on the Spanish Nationalists for so long now by Leftist propagandists that in many quarters the Nationalist Government is erroneously believed to be fascist. As a consequence it has been subjected to an extraordinary amount of misunderstanding.

Fascism is liable to several different definitions and interpretations. In the sense intended by the writers, however, it means, briefly, the totalitarian system of government in which the State claims supremacy in all matters spiritual as well as material. This definition also fits Communism, which like Fascism is completely alien to the Spanish temperament and character.

Judged by this standard, the Government of the New Spain being established by Generalissimo Francisco Franco and his Nationalists definitely is not fascist. To brand it as such is to do it a great injustice. Likewise it is an affront to those patriotic Spaniards who are attempting to build a New Spain based on high Nationalist principles.

There are a few fascist-minded individuals in Nationalist Spain, but their influence is negligible. By the very nature of the Nationalist Government, the official one-party system of Franco Spain, is non-fascist. They represent the fascist label being applied to the Nationalists. Besides, they are too Christian to favor a totalitarian system which puts the Church and the individual at the complete mercy of the State.

So far as the writers could observe, Germany and Italy will reverse little if any influence in the domestic policies of the Government of the New Spain. The intense pride and individualism of the Spaniards is a factor which the religious fervor are the great safeguard of the New Spain has against passing to Communism.

The Nationalists themselves prefer to describe the Government of the New Spain as authoritarian. It is a type of government which from a careful study by these correspondents appears to be popularly Spanish and adapted entirely to the needs of Spain and of Spain's people. The power and authority of this government at least for the time being is centralized in the State but with certain moral restrictions on it. Without these restrictions the power would be grave danger of a completely totalitarian regime in the New Spain.

Restore Peace, Order. The Nationalists believe that the State must be restored throughout the whole of Spain before any sort of electoral system can be instituted there. They remember only too well the Soviet type of democracy of murder, pillage, assault, stolen elections and similar excesses which prevailed under the so-called Popular Front Government of Spain prior to the outbreak of the war in July 1936.

Although totalitarian in some of its external aspects the New Spain of the Nationalists are building a paradoxically non-totalitarian in spirit and operation. War-time necessity is a reasonable excuse for the present totalitarian features. These are a controlled press, restricted freedom of speech, the one-party system, a mild religion of the people in other ways, and closely supervised and regulated commerce, industry and currency.

It is non-totalitarian or non-fascist in the accepted definition of these terms, however, for two important reasons. First of all it acknowledges the primacy of God. Then, secondly, it respects the dignity, sacredness and inviolability of the human personality and of family life.

From their studies of the type of government being established for the New Spain the writers are convinced that no citizen in it can be overshadowed by the brutal power of the Absolute State. It is their

Jews To Fight Communism

NEW YORK - An extensive campaign to eliminate Communist leadership from all American activities was pledged today by Milton Solomon, chairman of the American Jewish Federation to Combat Communism and Fascism.

In a statement outlining the plans for a national campaign, Mr. Solomon declared: "We shall oppose Communist and Communist leadership in every field of public activity, politics, labor and education. We shall oppose the election or appointment to public office of Communists or those holding Communist views, and this opposition to apply to any elective or appointive office, including teachers and professors of colleges and universities and in the public and private school systems of the country."

"We shall oppose membership in or official positions for Communists or those holding Communist views in labor unions and labor organizations, and we shall particularly oppose Communist leadership or the leadership of those sympathetic with Communist ideas in any Jewish organizations, charitable, civic or fraternal."

"Many of the organizations in the United States claiming to be motivated by purely patriotic purposes and which oppose Nazism or Fascism only, or which oppose Communism only, are not genuinely American in their objectives or in the methods they use to reach these objectives."

Philosophers Meet Set In Cincinnati

WASHINGTON - "Casually" in Current Philosophy" will be the general subject for the fourteenth annual national meeting of the American Catholic Philosophical Association, it was announced by the Rev. Dr. Charles C. Hays, of the Catholic University of America, in general charge of the program.
