SYMPOSIUM PLANS TO Be Discussed At Civic Centre Jan. 6

Patrick chairman and friends of the Discussion Club Movement in Rochester have been invited by the Rev. John M. Duffy, director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine to a meeting Friday, January 6, in the Columbus Civic Center to make arrangements for the Holy Year presentation of the High School symposium, January 29. It will take place in the Aquinas Institute Auditorium and the people of Rochester and surrounding towns are most cordially invited to attend.

The Rochester presentation will follow the first of the series of the symposiums of "The True Church of Christ and Its Mission" which will take place in St. Francis de Sales Parish Auditorium in Geneva Monday evening, January 22, at 8 o'clock. The eight speakers will represent each of the Catholic High Schools in the diocese: the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Aquinas Institute, St. Andrew's Seminary, Nazareth Academy and Our Lady of Mercy High School, Rochester; Holy Family High School, Auburn; De Sales High School, Geneva, and Maria Catholic High School, Elmira.

Following elimination contests in these schools this week, the winners will be announced next Friday.

The symposium is being held for the Catholic City of the diocese of Rochester to introduce them to the subject which will be the basis of discussion during the Lenten Discussion Club series starting the first full week of Lent. The speaker will endeavor to show the need for study of the Church and the interest and simplicity of the text.

May parishes have already organized their leaders for intensive preparation work prior to the work of the clubs next month.

The Bishop, who arrived in the city at 10:30 a. m., was greeted by a throng of well-wishers at the Cathedral of the Holy Name. He then proceeded to the City Hall where he received the keys of the city from the Mayor. The Bishop's benediction was broadcasted over the radio and was heard by millions of people throughout the country.
