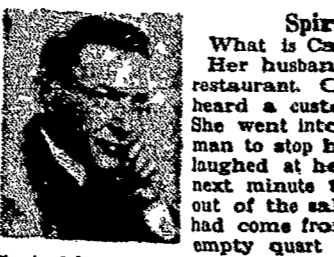
Oh, Mr. Elman!
