Golden Jubilee History Issued At Corpus Christi

Furnishing a complete record of fifty golden years of parish life and innumerable memories for parishioners of three generations, the Golden Jubilee History of Corpus Christi parish was issued to members of the parish, Sunday.

The history, comprising 76 pages and a cover of light green stamped with the words "Golden Jubilee History, Corpus Christi Parish, 1883 to 1933" in gold, was welcomed by the parishioners not only for the contents but for the excellent typographical arrangement throughout the book.

From a frontispiece line-drawing of the present Church by H. W. Klippert to the listing of present pupils in Corpus Christi School, the history contains articles, photographs and items of interest to the parishioners which will be read and re-read.

A photographic reproduction of the church interior on the occasion of the Golden Jubilee Mass celebrated by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James B. Kearney, presbyter for many years to come the memory of that auspicious occasion.

Full page photographs are presented of His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, the Most Rev. James B. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester; the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William M. Hart, V.G., pastor of Corpus Christi Church, a group including the pastor and his assistants, the Reverend Fathers Robert A. Keleher, Charles E. Reynolds and William O'Brien, and Bishop Kearney's predecessor, the Most Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, the Most Rev. John R. F. O'Hern and the Most Rev. Edward Mooney.

Likenesses of former pastors and assistants are spotted throughout the book. Of particular interest to present and former parishioners are the photos of Sisters who were in charge of the school and the present principal.

Prominence is given to the pictures of Patrick J. Lyman and A. Cunningham, trustees, and H. E. Reynolds and Peter J. Jones, auditors.

The articles deal with the beginning of the parish, progress made down through the years, the work carried on in Corpus Christi School and other events of interest.

An account of the Golden Jubilee observance with pictures taken at the time by Charles L. Goets has a prominent place in the history.

Lists are given of parishioners who held pews in Corpus Christi Church and of those subscribing to the Jubilee fund.

The typographical lay-out and printing was supervised by Howard W. Klippert, manager of the CATHOLIC COURIER, Henderson-Mosher, Inc., did the printing.

BARONESS TO TALK IN CANANDAIGUA Against Communism At C.D.A. lecture

Plans are well under way for a lecture on "Communism: Are Made, Not Born," by the Baroness de Hueck, in Canandaigua, N. Y., on Friday evening, Feb. 2, at 8 o'clock. The ticket committee is headed by Mrs. Maud Willis, chairman.

The speaker, Catherine deHueck, is a member of the former Russian nobility. Her father was Colonel of the Imperial Hussars; her uncle was first secretary of the Russian Embassy at Washington before the World War; her husband, Baron deHueck, comes from a family which dates back to the 12th century, becoming prominent in Russian history during the reign of Peter the Great.

The Baroness' girlhood was spent in military, diplomatic and court life of the Russian Tsars. During the revolution, her father and 21 of her relatives were killed by the Bolsheviks. The Baroness and her husband were imprisoned on their own estate in Finland and were sentenced to death. They escaped and for three years they fought against the Communists. The Baroness is now living in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, and is active in the fight against Communism in Toronto, New York City, and other cities throughout Canada and the United States. She has established Friendship Houses that provide study clubs and recreational facilities for those living in the slums, where the Baroness herself lives.

Priest Has No Business in a Street Car Strike

During the carmen's strike of 1937 in New Orleans, which industrial strife created nationwide interest on account of the status of organized labor, Dr. John O'Grady, executive secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, was called in an advisor. Even Catholics voiced their opinion that a priest had no business injecting himself into labor disputes and that he ought to mind his pulpit and stay in church where he belongs.

From all this we can easily conclude that priests not only may but must interest themselves in labor troubles where strikes and industrial friction are caused by neglect of the imperative divine commandment of love for our neighbor—maltreated and in distress. By the same command, Catholic lay people should be ready to use their influence in seeing to it that social justice is done, by upholding and putting into force the Christian principles and ideals that form the foundation of amicable, fair and just labor relations.

Why do Catholics realize so little the great need of social justice? Because these duties are not sufficiently explained and stressed in our Sunday sermons. All the available time is consumed by local announcements, by a little sermon on the gospel, and perhaps by stressing too much the necessity of various devotions. The true practice of religion, the daily living of our faith in contact with the world, is not emphasized as it should be, on account of lack of time.

This void in our system of instruction can be filled only by a good Catholic weekly which will regularly and faithfully point out our duty in this respect. We need not fear communism taking hold of this country, if we will take the argument away from the Communist. The only way that we can frustrate the endeavors of the enemy is by making the faithful see the necessity of fulfilling the law of love towards their neighbor. We must not tolerate conditions that rightly embitter the poor against society.

Thus, Catholics will confess themselves of adultery, of killing, of stealing and of lying, but rarely do we hear a penitent accuse himself of not having loved his neighbor as himself in social, economic and industrial matters. A priest will never hear in confession, "Father I underpay my servants; I am hard and cruel and too exacting toward them; I give starvation wages to my laborers. I do not provide sanitary working conditions; no provision is made for my aged workers when they are old and disabled they are fired without a pension or support; I object to my employees organizing for their own protection." Notwithstanding the fact that Catholic employers do not confess themselves of these sins, these are indeed grievous sins and deserve and demand a fearful reckoning.

The pertinent encyclicals on this subject, issued by Leo XIII and Pius XI, forcefully and definitely bring out as a sacred duty, our obligation to help correct and ameliorate conditions of working people who are treated as labor slaves.

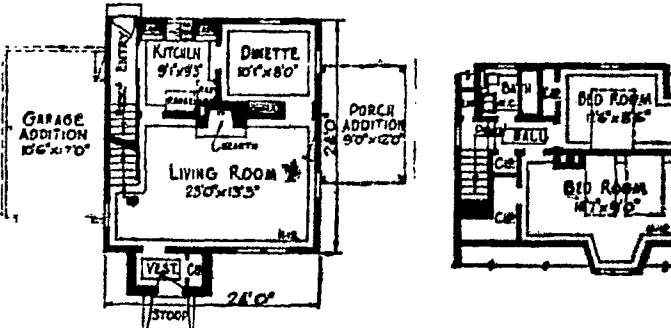
