Old Age Insurance Report Given

"Almost half of New York State's entire population is entitled to participate in celebrating the second anniversary of the Federal old-age insurance system," Mr. Kruesel, manager of the Rochester Field Office of the Social Security Board, stated today upon receipt of the annual report of Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Regional Director of the Social Security Board. Summarizing the progress of the program since it went into effect two years ago, Mrs. Rosenberg reported that applications for social security account numbers in New York State now total more than 5,700,000, and that nationally more than 42,000,000 applications have been handled by the Board.

The old-age insurance program in this section is directed by Mr. Kruesel through the Social Security Board's field office located at 65 Broad Street, Rochester.
