Monroe County Treasury

Rochester, N. Y. January 2, 1939. The assessment rolls for the general county tax levied in 1938 and payable in 1939 have been placed in my hands for collection. All persons named thereon are required to pay the tax assessed to them before the 15th day of April next, subject to the following conditions as provided in Section 13 of Chapter 40 of the laws of 1938.

FEES WILL BE ADDED AS FOLLOWS:

All of January without fees. February 1st to 20th, inclusive, 1 per cent.

March 1st to 31st, inclusive, 2 per cent.

April 1st to 14th, inclusive, 3 per cent.

After April fourteenth said addition of 3 per cent and also fees and penalties at the rate of 8 per cent per annum.

In case of default a warrant will be issued for the collection thereof according to law.

On August 1st an additional fee of \$1.00 for advertising will be charged. On the 15th day of August a list of all unpaid taxes will be published on the 20th day of August all unpaid taxes will be sold and can be redeemed only by paying advertising and sales charges with interest.

Office hours—A. M. to 5 P. M. Saturdays to 11 A. M.

It will not be necessary to call at County Treasurer's office for bill. Send postal or letter, giving ward name, lot number and street. Tax bill will be mailed. Then mail bill with check to County Treasurer's office and receipt will be returned.

TOWN TAXES: Town taxes cannot be paid to County Treasurer until June 1st, but should be paid to the Town Collector. Address will be furnished by the County Treasurer on request.

Diocese Joins in Marking Coronation of Pope

HOMAGE TO PIUS XII OFFERED AT SPECIAL Pontifical Rites In Pro-Cathedral

With earnest prayers for his intentions, faithful of the Diocese of Rochester on Sunday paid altar homage to the new Holy Father of all Christendom special services marking the solemn coronation of Holiness Pope Pius XII, at the Pro-Cathedral on that day.

Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral was the scene of a special Pontifical Mass at noon, when His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, officiated at colorful and impressive services.

"May our prayers go up in abundance that God will bless the Vicar on earth," beseeched His Excellency, the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., in the sermon for the occasion.

In an eloquent address based on the text, in Christ's words, "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build My Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it," Archbishop Hickey reviewed the Church's history and dwell particularly upon St. Gregory the Great, Pope and Doctor, whose Feast Day it was.

"Today as we are looking towards Rome where the successor of St. Peter is being crowned in glory, we give thought to what has come into the world from the Church for the last ninety years."

The Archbishop outlined contributions made by the Pope from Pope Pius IX down to the present covering pronouncements of dogmas on the Immaculate Conception and Infallibility of the Church, issuance of the great Encyclical on Charity, and proclamation of Justice, Charity, and Legislation by the great Pope, Pius IX, Leo XIII, Pius X and Benedict XV.

Pope Pius XI, said the speaker, recalled the Great St. Gregory during the past seventeen years, Pope Pius XI whose soul was filled with love of God, strove in every way to bring the world to know God he said.

Asking for prayers for the man now sitting in the Chair of Peter, Archbishop Hickey said he begins his work with the consciousness that he is God's representative on earth. His heart is filled with love for God and God's faithful.

The Archbishop urged that all should pray to become faithful children of God's great church. Bishop Kearney and officers of the Mass with visiting prelates and priests were escorted into the Pro-Cathedral through a double line of drawn swords held by uniformed Knights of St. John and Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus.

Assisting in the Mass were Assistant Priest, the Rt. Rev. Magr. William M. Hart, O.S.A., Dean of Honor, the Rt. Rev. Magr. William M. Berigan, Chancellor of the Diocese, and the Rt. Rev. Magr. George V. Burns, Dean of the Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph S. Cameron, Subdeacon, the Rt. Rev. Magr. Charles F. Shay, First Master of Ceremonies, the Rt. Rev. Magr. J. F. Goggin, Second Master, the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, Vicar-Chancellor.

Present also were the Rev. John M. Duffy, Diocesan Superintendent of Catholic Education; the Rev. John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., principal of Aquinas Institute; the Rev. Daniel P. Munday, C.M., Niagara University; the Rev. Joseph Leahy, S.J., San Jose "al"; the Rev. John P. O'Brien and the Rev. J. P. Mallon, C.S.B.

Responses were sung by St. Andrew's Seminary Choir under the direction of the Rev. Benedict Ekmann of St. Bernard's Seminary, choir of Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral choir.

Catholic lay leaders prominent citizens and representatives of schools of the diocese had prominent places.

Attired in caps and gowns were students of Nazareth College and Niagara University, Rochester Division; Nazareth Academy, Mercy High School Academy of the Sacred Heart and Aquinas Institute students attended.

Early Sunday morning many throughout the diocese arose early to hear the ceremonies of the Coronation broadcast from Vatican City.

WASHINGTON.—The wish of the Government of Ireland to maintain peace and its determination to provide adequate defense to attain that end was announced in a statement by Premier Eamon de Valera issued at the Irish Legation here yesterday.

"The desire of the Irish people and the desire of the Irish Government," the statement said, "is to keep our nation out of war. The aim of Government policy is to maintain and preserve our neutrality in the event of war. The best way and the only way to secure our aim is to put ourselves in the best position possible to defend ourselves so that no one can hope to attack us or violate our territory with impunity. We know of course, that should an attack come from a power other than Great Britain Great Britain in her own interests must help us to repel it. The Irish Government has not entered into any commitments with Great Britain and is free to follow any course that Irish interests might dictate."

Unexcelled Ceremony Marks Crowning of Pope Pius XII

attended a throne erected before the Holy Door to receive the oblation of the Canon and clergy. The address of homage was read by the Dean of the Basilica Chapter, as the Holy Father had not yet named the Cardinal Archbishop of the Basilica, who customarily performs this office. Then the procession reformed and entered the Basilica proper.

The Papal procession stopped before the Chapel of the Trinity, and the Holy Father descended from the Gestatorial Chair to adore the Blessed Sacrament. Then His Holiness remounted the Gestatorial Chair and was carried to the Gregorian Chapel, where he received the obedience of the Cardinals, Patriarch and Deacons, while psalms were sung.

Appearance of Pope Pius XII within the Vatican Basilica was the signal for a tremendous outburst of spontaneous acclaim from the vast congregation. It continued incessantly as the Papal procession moved from point to point within the great edifice.

Having received the obedience in the Gregorian Chapel, the Sovereign Pontiff ascended again to the Gestatorial Chair and the procession formed once more. This time His Holiness moved toward the altar of the Chair of St. Peter. But three times on route the procession halted, and each time the Master of Ceremonies reminded the Pontiff that worldly honors are fleeting at best. The ceremonial officer held aloft, on a long wand, a quick-burning piece of wax lighted on both ends. Each time while the flames consumed the material, he said: "Pater Sanctus: intrans gloria mundi" (Holy Father thus passes the glory of this world).

As Mass Begins: When he had arrived at the altar bull over St. Peter's tomb, Pope Pius XII began Mass. There were in attendance 50 members of the Sacred College including the three Cardinals from the United States, 100 Bishops, and 20 Abbots. His Eminence Pierre Cardinal Gerlier, Archbishop of Lyon, France, was Deacon of the Mass, and Monsignor Arturo Wynen, an Auditor of Sacred Roman Rota, was Subdeacon.

Following the Confiteor, he went to all on his throne, and there the Pallium was placed upon him. After prayers had been recited by His Eminence Genaro Cardinal Granito Pignatelli, of Belmont, Dean of the Sacred College, His Eminence Enrico Cardinal Caspari, and His Eminence Angelo Maria Cardinal Dolci, the pallium was placed over the Pontiff's shoulders by Cardinal Gerlier, Dominican and fastened with three jeweled brooches. Then His Holiness received the obediences of the Cardinals, Archbishops, Abbots, and Penitentiaries of the Basilica. During the Mass, the Epistle and the Gospel were sung in Greek by the Subdeacon and Deacon, respectively of the Greek Rite, after they had been sung in Latin.

At the elevation, a great silence had settled upon the immense Basilica, silver trumpets rang out from the inside balcony of the dome, in a melody specifically written for this purpose. It was an angelic song, flowing down from Heaven.

Pope Pius XII received Holy Communion not at the altar, but on his throne, where he took the consecrated Host and the chalice of consecrated Wine from the Subdeacon and Deacon. It was the most solemn moment in the ceremony. The Sovereign Pontiff and the entire congregation knelt, as the Blessed Sacrament was carried from the altar to the Pagan throne by the Deacon and Subdeacon. Striding his breast three times, like the most humble of sinners.

His Holiness repeated three times: "Domine non sum dignus" (O Lord, I am not worthy). Crowns of Pius XII: When Mass was over, the Holy Father again ascended the Gestatorial Chair, after having received a white velvet purse containing a symbolic gift of alms. The procession then formed for the concluding part of the ceremony—the coronation.

Following the coronation in the Basilica, Pope Pius XII rested for a few minutes before appearing on the balcony for the coronation. This caused no delay, however, as it served to give those who were in the Basilica the opportunity to leave and to take up their places in St. Peter's Square.

The flag of the Holy Roman Church was hoisted on the balcony of the Basilica for the first time since 1870.

The Palestine Guard was drawn up in front of the Basilica, while Italian troops were drawn up close by. Before and after the coronation the band of the Palestine Guard played Italian anthems, and the Italian military band responded with the Papal hymn.

Up until this time the moment of coronation Pope Pius XII had not worn the tiara, only the mitre. A stand had been erected especially in the hall over the porch for the actual coronation. When His Holiness was seated on his throne on his stand, the choir began to sing "The Golden Crown is on His Head" and the people in the square joined in the coronation.

At this point His Eminence Nicola Cardinal Casali, the Cardinal Second Deacon approached His Holiness and removed the mitre from his head. Then Cardinal Casali, Dominican, as Cardinal Deacon, placed on the Pontiff's head the sacred triple tiara, pronouncing the words of coronation, "This is the precious tiara used by Pope Pius IX."

His coronation having taken place, Pope Pius XII gave the Apostolic Blessing "Urbi et Orbi" ("To the City and to the World"). The great concourse of people in the square received this blessing devoutly, and then burst again into great applause, as the bells of Rome rang out joyously.

The enthusiasm mounted to its highest pitch when, following the act of coronation, His Holiness left his throne, and approaching the balustrade, saluted and blessed the great concourse of people.

Cardinal Casali, Dominican, announced that Pope Pius XII granted a plenary indulgence and the procession received a special blessing from the Holy Father to the Sala Sallustiana. Once more within this hall where His Holiness had donned the Pontifical robes before the Mass, His Eminence Genaro Cardinal Granito Pignatelli, of Belmont, Dean of the Sacred College, addressed congratulations to His Holiness in behalf of the Cardinals and His Holiness responded.

Speaking in Latin, Pope Pius XII pronounced a solemn diptych course. His Holiness thanked the Cardinals for their expression of congratulation and well wishes, and said he counted upon the cooperation of the Sacred College to enable him to bear the very heavy burden entrusted to him by Divine Providence.

Killey, Bishop of Trenton; the Most Rev. Ralph L. Hayes, Titular Bishop of Geropolis and Rector of the North American College in Rome; the Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph M. Corrigan, Rector of the Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C.; the Rt. Rev. Bernard A. McKenna, of Philadelphia and the Rev. Eglito Torres of San Pablo, Calif.

PROTESTANT HOSPITAL IS BOUGHT BY NUNS FOR AGED: DES MOINES, IA.—The former Protestant hospital on Clark Street here, idle since 1932, has been purchased by the Sisters of Mercy. The building, bought for \$25,000, will be used as a home for the aged. A 50-bed hospital, it was sold to the Hospital Association of the Evangelical Lutheran Iowa Conference, Augustana Synod. After several months of operation, it was made a maternity hospital branch of Iowa Lutheran hospital. The depression forced its abandonment in 1932.
