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Around The World

GREET CARD, GOMIA. Seville.—His Eminence Isidro Cardinal Goma y Tomas Primate of Spain, was received at the Cathedral here today following his return from Valencia City where he attended the coronation of His Holiness Pope Pius XII. Church and civic dignitaries and a great throng of the faithful assembled in the Cathedral to hear the Cardinal tell of his audience with the new Pontiff, who bestowed a special benediction on Spain.

CRICKET PLAYING PRIEST. London.—A priest who played for his county, Warwickshire at cricket, has died at the age of 74. He was the Rev. Edward Pereira who came under the influence of Cardinal Newman when he entered the Oratory School at the age of 10. He died a priest of the Birmingham Oratory. He was a priest when he played cricket against the Australians in England in 1886. They then described him as the field leader at point when he had met.

STAINED IRON DEATH. Burgos, Spain.—Newspapers throughout Nationalist Spain have published an article, with the former administrator of the Red newspaper Fragua Social in which he stated that he had seen an order from the Central Bureau of the Communist Party dictated by Stalin urging that the death sentence against Jose Antonio Primo de Rivera, founder of the Spanish Falange and son of the late Dictator, be carried out without delay. Fraga de Rivera was executed at Alicante early in the Civil War.

WRECKED CHURCH. Paris.—The interior of the church at Montmiral, an important town in Champagne and the site of a Napoleonic victory has been wrecked by a 28-year-old workman named Georges Normie. With a heavy hammer he broke statues, the tops of the organ, all the objects decorating the altar and the pulpit from which St. Vincent de Paul had preached. The destruction was checked only when the arm of the hammer was broken. Mr. Normie was arrested and that he was trying to reform the church. Preliminary investigation indicates that Normie is of unknown mind.

14TH BISHOP DIES. Paris.—The Most Rev. Eugene Jacques Grelier, Titular Archbishop of Caesarea in Cappadocia and former Bishop of Laval has died at Laval. He was the last of the 14 French Bishops consecrated by Pius X after the capture of Rome with the Republic. They were consecrated in February 1906 for immediate occupation of 14 sees within the hostility of the civil power had left vacant for a long period. Archbishop Grelier was originally from Annou. He was 84 and had been a priest for 65 years.

ACQUAINTANCE WITH PUS. Milan (City)—His Holiness Pope Pius XII received in audience the Queen Mother of Belgium and Prince Baudouin the nine-year-old crown Prince of that country. In this most cordial meeting the Holy Father and her grandson his great-grandson in the fact that he had attended his solemn coronation accompanying the Queen and Prince at the wedding of the Italian's Ambassador to the Holy See.

MENONCHA CHURCH OFFERS. Spain.—The Church of Santa Maria at Mahon, Balearic Islands, was opened for public worship yesterday. It was announced at Nationalist headquarters here that there had been no celebration of Mass for 31 months since the Red occupation of the Island of Minorca. The church had been badly damaged by the Leflants. Lieutenant Rivara, who commanded the forces which revolted against the Red rule, gave an interview to newspapers in which he stated that 41 priests had been slain at Mahon in one night.

SPANISH EXHIBITION. Vitoria, Spain.—The National Society of Spanish Arts announced today that Italy, Germany, Portugal, Switzerland, England, France, Belgium, Argentina and Uruguay will take part in the exposition of sacred art to be held here in the near future. Private collections from the United States, Romania, the Netherlands and Albania also will be shown.

SERMONS ON THE AIR. Paris.—The Paris-Mondial radio stations the national post organized to serve all French colonies, no matter what the distance from the mother country, is broadcasting the Lenten sermons from Notre Dame Cathedral. These sermons have been carried by Radio-Paris but now the words of Canon George Chevrot will be carried to the ends of the earth. The 1938 sermons of Canon Chevrot, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Parish, attracted a new audience of 4000 sets in the Cathedral are reserved for men, but last year there were such crowds that on some Sundays the doors were closed before the sermon commenced.

Franco Returns Church Lands

BURGOS (VNC).—Abolition by the Franco Government of the Law on Confessions and Religious Congregations automatically annuls the sectarian legislation of the Republic enacted as the interpretation of Articles 2 and 7 of the Constitution of the Spanish Republic.

The two articles constituted the Republic's conception of separation of Church and State. Article 26 regarded "all religious confessions as Associations subject to the same law," without economic or other aid on the part of the State, dissolved Religious Orders requiring a special law "of obedience to authority distinct from the legitimate authority of the State," prohibited teaching and other occupations to Religious, nationalized their property and authorized a special law to govern Religious.

Article 27 proclaimed religious liberty placed all religions under civil jurisdiction, prohibited public manifestations of religion without specific Government authorization, and stated that religious status would have no bearing on civil or political personality except in the case of the President of the Republic and the President of the Council of Ministers. Article 29 excluded ecclesiastical, religious and professed Religious from the Presidency.

Church Regains Property. By amendment of the enabling act of Articles 2 and 27, the Church regains juridical possession of her property. In fact, such property has been returned to her since the beginning of Nationalist Spain. Religious Orders and pious Associations have had returned to them their complete autonomy under the tutelage and direction of ecclesiastical authority.

The Republic had arrogated to itself the faculty of regulating and controlling the interior and administrative life of the Orders and Associations as though the Church, the respective ecclesiastical authority no longer existed. But now the Church returns to her legal status prior to 1931.

During the year the Franco Government has not only eliminated all laws hostile to the Church but it has enacted new laws profoundly affecting the religious life of the country.

His Eminence Giuseppe Cardinal Pizzardi has been named Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities, an office which the late Pope Pius XI retained to himself.

His Eminence Massimo Cardinal Maschini has been named President of the Commission on the Authentic Interpretation of the Code of Canon Law.

Monsignor Alberto Arborio-Mella di Sant'Elia has been named Maestro di Camera of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, an office he held under the Holy Father's predecessor.

Monsignor Federico Callori di Vignale, Carlo Emanuele Toraldo, and Mario Naselli Rocca di Correliano have been named Private Chamberlains Participant. Monsignors Confalonieri and Venini were private secretaries to Pope Pius XI.

Radicals Now Menace U. S.

NEW YORK (VNC).—That we "keep out of our country the whole brood of roving world revolutionaries," that we "correct our known grievous social abuses," and that we "promote within our boundaries the secure welfare of all our citizens," were recommendations contained in the address which the Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, delivered at the Communio Breakfast of the Catholic League at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, here, Sunday morning.

Asserting that "the traditions and the vitality of this nation demand that we face the problems of our own economy fearlessly and intelligently," Monsignor Ready said that, "if we have fears about the healthy condition of our national life they spring honestly from a neglect of religious principle and a waywardness in the issue of education."

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Convinced of the wisdom of George Washington's observation that national morality cannot prevail where religious principles are excluded, Monsignor Ready said "we would wish that our government schools could bring to our children the best of our country's guiding moral principles and spiritual strength which insure the permanency of our democratic institutions."

One need not look far in our modern life to find the consequences of godlessness," he continued. "The preacher of old was known that faith in God is the necessary fountain source from which springs respect for the rights of man. Consequently, he bends all his energy to the driving of God upon the hearts of his hearers so men believe in God and are loyal to that belief the rights of the individual and of minority groups will be recognized and respected."

The very concepts of the future of our country are embodied in the Declaration of Independence in the faith there expressed in the Greater Upon that faith stands the doctrine of liberty and justice for all men in our Constitution and laws.

It seems to me that we are faced with one very important and important decision in effecting a true social reform in the United States. Similar bills have been introduced and passed in every state of the Ohio General Assembly for the last 25 years. One bill did pass, but was vetoed by the former Governor A. V. Donahay. The Committee vote was ten for and three against.

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Bishop Mahoney, Known In This Diocese, Dies

SOUX FALLS, S. DAK. (VNC). The Most Rev. Bernard J. Mahoney, Bishop of Sioux Falls, died at Rochester, Minn., early Monday morning. It is announced in Sioux Falls that he died at the age of 64 years.

Funeral services will be held in St. Joseph's Cathedral, Friday morning. The Most Rev. Francis J. Kelly, Bishop of Winona, Minn., will be celebrant of the Pontifical Mass of Requiem. The Most Rev. John Gregory Murray, Archbishop of St. Paul, will preach the sermon.

The Sioux Falls Prelate made his last visit to Rochester, N. Y., in June, 1932, to conduct a retreat for the priests at St. Bernard's Seminary.

He worked his way through college as a telegrapher, and entered St. Mary's College, Elmira, N. Y., in September, 1892.

Bishop Thomas M. A. Burke of Albany recognized the young student's unusual ability and designated him to pursue courses at the North American College in Rome, where he was ordained to the priesthood in 1904.

Returning to the United States in 1905, Father Mahoney was appointed as assistant to the pastor of St. Peter's Church, Troy, where he served five years. At the end of this time he was recalled to the North American College to serve as spiritual director, and held that office until he was elevated to the Episcopate in 1922.

Appointed as Bishop of Sioux Falls on May 28, 1922, and his consecration took place on June 28 of that year. Conducted Many Missions.
