The assessment rolls for the general county tax levied in 1938 and payable in 1939 have been placed in my hands for collection. All persons named therein are required to pay the tax assessed to them before the 15th day of April next subject to the following conditions as provided in Section 13 of Chapter 44 of the laws of 1938.

Fees will be added as follows:
All of January without fees.
February 1st to 15th, inclusive, 1 per cent.
March 1st to 31st, inclusive, 2 per cent.
April 1st to 15th, inclusive, 3 per cent.
After April fourteenth said collection of 3 per cent. and also penalties at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum.

Town taxes cannot be paid to County Treasurer until June 1st, but should be paid to the Town Collector whose address will be furnished by the County Treasurer on request.

COMMUNISM TERMED 'DEABOLICAL' BY Niagara Professor In Encyclical Talk

"To counteract this diabolical influence," the Rev. Oswald E. Morton, C.M., Niagara University professor, in a stirring denunciation of Communism Sunday called for a renewal of Christian charity and prayer.
Communism is an anti-Christ doctrine founded on a false philosophy. Father Morton told an audience of 300 in Columbus Civic Center ballroom in explaining the encyclical, "Divine Redemption," by the late Pope Pius XI.

The Rev. Joseph V. O'Driscoll, C.M., professor of political sciences, said that the series of Lenten lectures on the late Holy Father's Encyclicals, given at the invitation of Bishop Kearney, with an address by Father Morton last Sunday in Columbus ballroom at 3 P. M.

MINGLING OF RELIGIOUS, PROFANE OBSERVANCES DENOUNCED BY PRELATE

MEXICO CITY. The Most Rev. Jesus Villalaz, Bishop of Tehuacan, in his Lenten pastoral warned against the mingling of the profane with religious observances and reminded that without the reception of the Sacrament of Penance, Lenten observance is not sanctified. He also directed attention to abuses in the administration of parish funds by lay committees.
His Excellency stated that he has observed that a good portion of the people of his diocese are much affected by religious feasts which he notes also that quite a few of those who make a great display of religion by participating in the processions, do not go to church at other times. He pointed out that these feasts he adds, "is that few are those who approach the confessional."
