Almighty God, having raised Saul from a low station in life to the throne of Israel, ordered him by the mouth of the prophet Samuel to march against the Amalekites and utterly destroy their nation without sparing either man or beast. Saul accordingly went out to battle and gained a complete victory; but he neglected to carry out the instructions of the prophet and spared both Agag, king of Amalek, and the best and fattest of the flocks. Saul afterward Samuel at God's command came to the camp and hearing the bleating of sheep and the lowing of cattle asked Saul what the sound meant. The king replied that it was a portion of the spoils which they had preserved to offer in sacrifice.
