CAPITAL LETTER

Christian Ideology Stressed At Washington

WASHINGTON—The concern of the United States Government over the march of events in Europe is only too apparent. Both the President and Secretary of State Hull have given expression to this concern.

It is based on two considerations. First, the possibility that Nazism will become rooted in the Western Hemisphere by means of German propaganda. This is the doctrinal aspect of the world situation. Nazi doctrine is of course the antithesis of democratic doctrine and of Christian doctrine.

Steps have been taken or are now under consideration to check Nazism's spread. One of these is the more vigorous effort to deal with foreign spies operating in this country. Another is the strengthening of the deportation laws to provide for the expulsion of aliens who carry on propaganda activities. Still another is the continuing investigation of subversive activities by the Dies Committee.

But there are regarded as only minor precautions. It is generally recognized that the only effective way of combating Nazi doctrine and to preach Christian ideas to counteract Nazi paganism and materialism. This is why so much stress is being laid upon the need of a viable and practical Christianity. Take for example a paragraph from an address delivered a few days ago by Francis H. Sayre, Assistant Secretary of State. Democracy means more than a form of government. It means belief in a larger freedom for individual men and women in equality before the law of all men in human brotherhood. It means a profound faith that the ultimate values in life lie in individual human personalities. You see it gets down pretty close to the fundamentals of Christianity. If we are to find solutions for the seemingly insoluble national and international problems which beset us on every hand, we are going to need a catastrophe and move forward in a great march of human progress. It must be and can only be by a return to the bedrock principles which Christ taught 1,900 years ago. In spite of the fact that so-called practical men have proved and it is proving that Christ was the most daring and understanding realist that ever lived. This was and is before a political organization a few years ago.

Priest Exposes Atheist Activity

WASHINGTON—The wide extent of activity by a subversive atheistic group in the United States was emphasized here by the Rev. Paul B. Ward, C.S.P., Editor of Wisdom, organ of the Trinity League American unit of the Catholic Pro-Life Society.

Father Ward, who founded the League addressed members of the Clerical Conference of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade at the Catholic University of America. He warned that members of the Conference should not be outdone in zeal by Communists "who have distributed 13,000,000 newspapers and 23,000,000 pamphlets free."

Calling the power of atheistic groups, he declared that the American Association for the Advancement of Atheism collected over \$2,000,000 in one State alone last year and that recently Communists raised \$500,000 to open branches of the Daily Worker, Communist newspaper, in Chicago and San Francisco.

Father Ward declared that Godless groups have two magazines in the United States: two in England, three in Germany, two in France, one in Japan and four in China.

College Column

NOTRE DAME
Major changes calling for an enlarged scope for graduate work in the social service program at the University of Notre Dame were announced today by university authorities.

The announcement coincided with the appointment of Prof. Frank T. Flynn by the president of the university, Rev. John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., as Director of the Graduate Program in Social Work. The changes announced include extensive revision of courses, new field work facilities which call for increased cooperation with South Bend social workers, and new courses of studies. The new director stated that the department will meet all the requirements of the American Association of Schools of Social Work for Type I schools.

The new courses to be added include one in social insurance which will take cognizance of the changes in this field which have occurred during the past few years. Two other new courses to be offered in the Fall Term are in public welfare administration and medical information.

The Knights of Columbus were the original sponsors of the courses in social service at Notre Dame, and they have continued to lend their support for training of Catholic leaders as a definite part of their Social Action program.

ATHEIST EDITOR FINED \$1,000 FOR SLANDERING BROTHERS OF CHARITY

BRUSSELS—Slander of the Brothers of Charity has resulted in a fine of \$1,000 for Dr. Modest Terwagne, formerly a member of the Belgian Parliament and Editor of La Paix, organ of Free Thought in Belgium.

Dr. Terwagne published a paragraph in that magazine calumniating the Brothers of Charity, who are entrusted by the Belgian Government with the care of asylums for insane males. The Brothers brought a court action against Dr. Terwagne, charging him with libel. Convicted in the Belgium Court of First Instance, he appealed the case, but the lower court's verdict was upheld in the Court of Appeals.
