An Urgent Appeal for the Sufferers of his Native China

His plea is for his people suffering, exhausted, famished and almost intolerable conditions. Bishop Yu Pin, the Viceroy of the Catholic War Relief Association of Nanking, China, visited the diocese on several occasions last year while touring the United States in search of funds to aid his countrymen.

As Co-founder and Director of the Catholic War Relief Association, Bishop Yu Pin is in close touch with the relief problem occasioned by the Sino-Japanese War. He was authorized by the late Pope Pius XI to appeal to American Catholics to relieve the stress.

Fr. Boland Discusses Labor at Men's Club

Need for a just wage and reasonable working conditions in industry, as "man's inherent and inalienable right" was emphasized here last Sunday morning by the Rev. Dr. John P. Boland of St. Mary's Church, Irondequoit, Father Boland's address.

"Prosperity cannot be maintained until the wage earner secures a living wage," Father Boland asserted, "when he said that the worker is entitled to an 'ample sufficiency' which will describe his share in the profits of industry; that is, a reasonable family living and a wage which will lead to moderate ownership."
