Chile is not too far away from tes North Americans It should stir us to realise that on Janu ary 21th an earthquake rocked tine populous section of Chile and killed some 40,000 people Remamber when that happened I throught not. We are too busy worrying about what is happen ing in Europe to pay attention to what happens in our own half of

Well, in case you're interested I found as Bishop Subercaseaux tasked that Chile is a long nar row strip along the sea coast with three divisions: the upper third is desert; the lower third is gon cold to be proported to say is foo cold to be populated to any large extent; and the central section," where the population is massed, was the one that was racked by the worst earthquake in generations.
