PROPAGATION MISSION INTENTION: That Missionaries may increase among the Catholics of England.

The Catholic history of England is an interesting one, filled with tales of active faith, devastating heresy and sublime courage. It was in 1066 that the great Pope Gregory I sent the Benedictine Monk, Augustine, to the pagan 'Angels.' Within a few years England herself was sending her own missionaries to win other people to the Cross of Christ.

When Luther, an ex-monk, defied his superiors and started his own religion, England's King Henry VIII went to the defense of Rome and merited for himself the title of 'Defender of the Faith.' However, the strong-willed and self-indulgent Henry later fell into war and carried many of his subjects into misery. Today this nation is beginning to recover from this horrible calamity and is emerging into the effulgence of faith. With this thought our late beloved Father Henry VIII went to the defense of his fervent wish that England may once again people the front line of Christianity with her missionary priests and sisters.

Catechists in China

A communication from the Rev. Joseph Regan of Lapa, Kwangsi, So. China, contains interesting news. Father Regan is a native of Fairhaven, Mass. He studied at St. Bernard's Seminary from 1919 to 1924 and then entered Maryknoll.

'Mission work in China is impossible — without catechists,' writes Fr. Regan. 'Ask any missionary what is his greatest need and he will answer, not a church, or a school or a residence, but good catechists. The missionary in China must go about the individual villages and grasp these opportunities that present themselves — perhaps one family here and another there — seldom able to convert one entire village at a time. Moreover, the missionary himself can do little. Always a foreigner in the eyes of the people, he may be refused entry to a village. How is it then, that he makes his contacts? It is through his auxiliaries, the native catechists, that he gains the guidance and direction of the mission, they break the ground and open the Chinese village to the word of God. What missionary or would be able to spread the word of God in the past 24 months instructing the people of only one village? Catechists do this work, teaching the doctrine and preparing the new converts for Baptism, not in one day, but many days. And when a man comes these catechists? They are not found on the highways and byways. They must be prepared and trained under the watchful guidance of an experienced missionary. The ideal method, and one that has the approval of all the ordinaries of China, is to train the catechists in schools established for their special instruction.

One thing that Father Regan failed to mention was the financial burden incurred from such a school. Moreover, these catechists must devote their entire time to religion and cannot accept other means of gainful employment. The missionary then is compelled to support the catechist and his family. They are content with little, but 'little' is not always easy to find. Perhaps some one of our readers would gladly assume the support of a catechist. It is \$5.00 per month. The presentation was made at the prison.

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

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
