WORLD CONGRESS PLANNED IN 1942

Mission Society To Mark Jubilee

VATICAN CITY — A great world congress for the propagation of the Faith is being planned. The proposal that such a demonstration be held, in 1942, was made this week in a resolution adopted by General Superior Council of the Pontifical Society for the Propagation of the Faith and the Secretariat of the Society was charged with drawing up a tentative program. The date 1942 was chosen because it will be the twentieth anniversary of the transfer of the International headquarters of the Society from France to Rome, and its establishment as a Pontifical association.

At almost the same time it was made known that the beatification of Pauline Jaricot, founder of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, will be urged at the next public Consistory.

Work for Native Clergy
Also it was announced that steps are to be taken to make better known and better organized the Pontifical Work of St. Peter the Apostle for Native Clergy in this connection, national directors are authorized to use, henceforth, for publicity purposes, the shorter title "Pontifical Society for Native Clergy." It is to be understood, however, that the official title will remain "The Pontifical Work of St. Peter the Apostle for Native Clergy" (Pontificum Opus a Sancto Petro Apostolo pro Clero Indigenis).

The inauguration of steps looking to an International Propagation of the Faith Congress three years hence was only one of a number of highly important actions taken by the General Superior Council of the Pontifical Society.

Pledge Is Taken In All Churches

Whole-hearted support for the drive against indecent literature, was manifested throughout the Diocese of Rochester as parishioners pledged themselves to wipe out this menace to morals. In every parish, the letter of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Bishop James E. Kearney, was read and a pledge taken. A strong spirit of cooperation has resulted.

Already the Rochester Pharmaceutical Society and the Cramer Drug Company have offered their cooperation. The disabled American Veterans of the World War are conducting a similar campaign. Reports from throughout the United States indicate that this move, now nationwide, will ultimately remove rotten literature from the newsstands.

In furthering this drive, the following code may be used to determine undesirable reading matter:

- a. Those which glorify crime and depict the criminal.
- b. Those whose contents are largely "sexy."
- c. Those whose illustrations and pictures border on the indecent.
- d. Those which make a habit of carrying articles on illicit love.

"KEEP FAIR CLEAN"

Fr. LeBuffe Calls Socialists To Action

BROOKLYN, N. Y. — Warning was given that every effort is being made to bring obscene shows to the New York World's Fair and an appeal made to exercise extreme vigilance against such additions to the exposition by the Rev. Francis P. LeBuffe, S. J., Western Sodality Secretary, at the second Corporate Communion Breakfast of the Socialists of the North Shore of Queens County.

Telling of his unsuccessful correspondence with officials of the Fair, Father LeBuffe said:

"They make promises; and look how they are fulfilling those promises. They are rushing through a bill at Albany to take the entertainment area under the jurisdiction of District Attorney Sullivan and Sheriff Fitzgerald and have it placed under the censorship of the World's Fair itself. This spells danger."

"I hope you can all see the World's Fair, but if it is not clean, then you should not go," he said. "You must let the World's Fair officials know you mean business."

Describing the Fair, Father LeBuffe said that "the seductively beautiful Soviet building towers over all, and from its height a huge giant holds aloft a red star; not a white star of faith and hope, but the red star of fire and blood that the living lie of that building stands for."

CATECHISTS CONVENE

5,000 Attend Regional Meet in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES — Five thousand and delegates and visitors from the Archdiocese of Los Angeles and suffragan sees of San Diego, Tucson and Monterey-Presidio attended the regional Congress of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine held here last Saturday and Sunday under the patronage of the Most Rev. John J. Cantwell, Archbishop of Los Angeles.

Educational leaders from all parts of the United States participated in the sessions, which were brought to a close with a public meeting addressed by Archbishop Cantwell and the Rev. James M. Gillis, C.S.P., editor of the Catholic World.

The Rev. Dr. John E. Kubie, National Director of the Center of the Confraternity and the Rev. Gregory Smith, Chairman of the National Center's Discussion Clubs, were among the principal speakers. The Most Rev. Daniel Gerwick, Bishop of Tucson, presided at the first public session.

Stressed during the conference was the work of religious vacation schools, which in the archdiocese last year enrolled 1,672 public school children. The necessity of extending the work more fully among Catholic boys and girls attending public high schools was emphasized, statistics showing that they represent four-fifths of the entire Catholic body of high-school age.

Boys Town Founder Scores Reformatory Organization

ST. LOUIS — The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward J. Flanagan, founder and Director of Boys Town, sharply criticized reformatories of today as ways and means to reduce juvenile delinquency in an address here last night before the Central States Probation and Parole Conference.

"The accent on delinquency must be shifted to prevention and off-children must pave the way for public emphasis upon that fact," declared Monsignor Flanagan. He pointed out that solution of the problem cannot be left to prevention alone, however. Referring to reformatories as
