Kimubi, Uganda Africa On March 14 Queen Emity Mukormugobi died at Rubaga at the advanced ago of a hundred wears. She was one of the last surviving eye-witnesses of the martyr dom of Christian Youtus of Uganda.

The late Queen was born in 18.39 dearing the reign of Sima II who keeps a harem of 20,000 women. In such surroundings, in which woman was considered as nothing more than a plaything or a chattel, she spent her childhood and early youth As a young woman she became one of the 85 waves of King Mukabya
