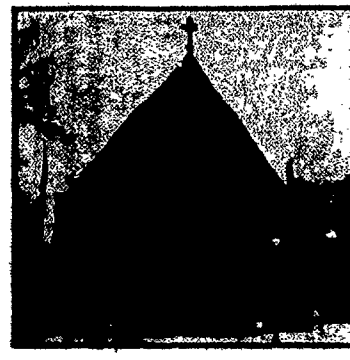

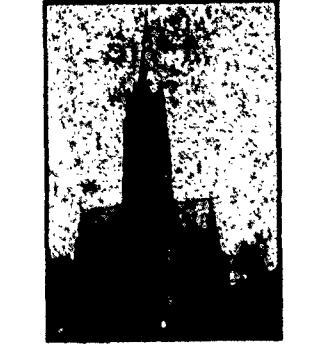

Adult Confirmation Class Listed May 21

Plans have been completed for the Adult Confirmation Class to be held at Corpus Christi Church, Sunday, May 21, at 4 P. M. The Most Rev. James E. Kearney will administer the Sacrament to the adult members of Corpus Christi Parish and other parishes in that section of the city. Members of all other parishes in the city will be confirmed in a special class at the Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral Sunday evening, May 21, at 8 P. M.

Children of Corpus Christi Parish are attending May devotions daily in honor of the Mother of God.

Mass is celebrated each morning at the altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary, after which the children say the Rosary. At the request of His Holiness, Pius XII, the Prayers for Peace are also said.

The schedule of Masses for Ascension Thursday, which is May 18, is as follows: 5:30, 6:15, 7:00, 7:45, 8:30, 9:30 A. M. The Mass at 8:30 will be a High Mass.

(Continued from Page 1) (See Parish Page for complete story) Harry P. Wareham is in charge of this 22nd annual campaign. He has pointed out that since 1918, the Community Chest Drive has saved Rochester from 1,218 individual small campaigns. Rochester may also boast of its drive cost only 5.3 cents out of every dollar is used for collection and disbursement purposes. This leaves 94.7 cents for the carrying out of charitable work.

From the funds realized through this campaign, aid will be given to the following Catholic agencies: St. Mary's Hospital, St. Mary's Boys' Home, St. Patrick's Girls' Home, St. Ann's Home for the Aged, St. Elizabeth's Guild House, Charles Settlement House, Genesee Institute and Columbus Youth Association.

Besides these Catholic institutions, the following are aided by the Chest and in turn render assistance to Catholics: Public Health Nursing Association, Milk in Schools Committee, Legal Aid Society, Tuberculosis and Health Association and the Boy and Girl Scouts.

St. Ann's Home for the Aged 60,149 days care given to 203 different aged men and women. St. Mary's Boys' Home 46,148 days care given to 152 homeless, dependent and neglected children.

St. Patrick's Girls' Home 31,141 days care given to 113 homeless, dependent and neglected children. St. Mary's Hospital Gave 58,298 days care and treatment to 6,296 patients; 4,197 days care part pay, 4,172 days care free, 606 babies born; 1,990 ambulance calls. Emergency department treated 1,660 patients; 3,496 patients made 20,482 visits to Out Patient Department, 9,112 free visits including 6,412 for the City of Rochester.

Charles Settlement House and cultural activities to boys and girls—1,300 in registered groups. Total attendance, 51,450—22,457 contacts through unregistered groups; workers made 546 home visits. Columbus Youth Association Offered educational, social, cultural, health and recreational services to men, women, boys and girls. Unregistered groups 2,900. Registered groups 2,788. Total Membership 5,600. Service group 70. Self-improvement group 20. Total Attendance 175,438.
