

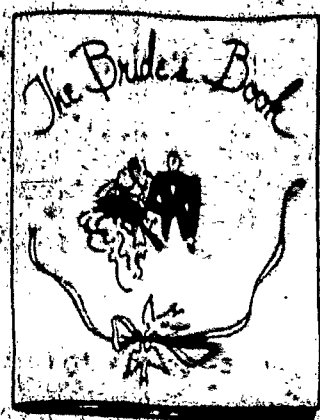

Annual Baccalaureate exercises of Nazareth College will be held Sunday, May 28, at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart with His Excellency the Most Rev. James E. Kearney celebrating a Solemn Pontifical Mass at 12:00 noon. The public is invited to attend.

In special religious exercises of graduation, thirty-two young nurses of St. Mary's Hospital were to receive the blessing of His Excellency the Most Rev. James E. Kearney at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart, this afternoon (Thursday) at 4 p. m.

The baccalaureate sermon will be preached by the Rev. John F. Kearney, C.M., of St. John's University, Brooklyn, following presentation of the class by the Rt. Rev. Marg. George V. Burns.

A procession in which the Bishop of Rochester, who is the principal speaker at the opening session of the National Laywomen's Retreat Movement, 1939 Congress on Saturday evening, June 3, at the Hotel Commodore, Bishop Kearney is a life-long friend of the Society of the Religious of the Cenacle, under whose auspices the Congress is being held. Ithaca Catholic Daughters Mark Silver Anniversary

ITHACA—As a fitting climax to their varied events marking the Silver Jubilee of Court Santa Maria 240, Catholic Daughters of America here, an anniversary dinner was held Tuesday evening, May 16, at the Hotel, The Rt. Rev. Marg. Charles P. Shay, pastor of Holy Rosary Church in Rochester, was the principal speaker.

Other events included reception of Holy Communion on Mother's Day, attendance at High Mass the same night for the mothers living and dead of all members of the court, and a pageant for members and former members only the next evening, depicting the 25 years' existence of the Court.

A jubilee Mass was celebrated on Tuesday morning, May 15. Monsignor Shay, at the jubilee dinner, remarked that he felt "right at home" and made allusion in response to those of the Rev. William Byrne, his friend.

"If there has been any disturbance in the world," Monsignor Shay said in his address, "it has been as the result of the misuse of the faculties that God gave to mankind. Christ has shown a definite program and followed it, pointed out that no individual or nation could succeed without using reason, will power and the doctrine of Christianity. You can go down through the golden age of civilization to today and you will find that the destruction of intellect and will power will always bring about the destruction of civilization."

"It behooves us," he told the women, to give an example of what it means to think correctly and to will correctly. The speaker named three aspects of action: the home, the church and the state.

Monsignor Shay advised the Catholic women that their organization will be their young people, keep the minds of the youth straight," he recommended. "If you are staunch defenders of our faith as you are tonight, then 25 years from now the stars and stripes will still be waving over this land."

Other speakers were Miss Kathryn Leary, grand regent who gave the address of welcome; Mrs. Elizabeth Hannon, district deputy of Cortland; Mrs. Anna Lucid, vice regent of Cayuga; Mrs. Joseph B. Myers, and Louis P. Smith, Miss Margaret Frantz, financial secretary, was toastmistress. The invocation was offered by the Rev. Robert Kres and the benediction by the Rev. Paul Cuddy.

Vocal selections were presented by Miss Mary Bell, soprano, and Lawrence Culligan, tenor. Miss Mary Clines was accompanist. Dinner music was provided by a three-piece orchestra from Phi Mu Alpha, Ithaca College music fraternity.

The court in observing its silver jubilee recalled that in the spring of 1914, Dr. Frank M. Ryan, grand knight of Ithaca Council, 227, Knights of Columbus, and Mrs. Mona attended a K of C meeting in Sayre Pa. Mrs. Mona was entertained by Court St. Mary, CIDA, and decided to form a court in Ithaca.
