

Catholics To Mark Memorial Day

A Low Mass to be celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, at 9 o'clock in Sacred Heart Cathedral will be the first event of Catholic interest on Memorial Day, Tuesday.

Catholics will have representation in the annual Memorial Day parade which begins at 9:15 A. M. The Rev. John M. Duffy, superintendent of Catholic Schools, will head the division.

Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John, under command of Col. Frederick J. Wegman, will report in full dress uniform at headquarters, St. Joseph's Church, Franklin Street, at 8:30 A. M. sharp and then proceed to the falling-in place in the parade.

Four Catholic school bands will be in line, those of Aquinas Institute in their brand new uniforms, Blessed Sacrament School band, St. Monica's band and Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral band.

Pupils of the following schools will be in line: Sacred Heart, Blessed Sacrament, Corpus Christi, Good Counsel, Holy Apostles, Holy Family, Holy Redeemer, Holy Rosary, Immaculate Conception, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, Perpetual Help, St. Ambrose, St. Andrew and St. Anthony's.

Speaks At Kenmore

Miss Dorothy Hall, worker at Genesee Institute, addressed a large group of Socialists last Sunday at a Communion breakfast held at St. Paul's Church in Kenmore, a suburb of Buffalo. The "Settlement House," with which she is so familiar, was the topic chosen by Miss Hall.

"The settlement is social, educational and recreational center for an underprivileged neighborhood," Miss Hall defined it, supplements the work of the home school and Church during leisure hours.

Miss Hall described and explained the different classes and types of people benefited by the settlement, and the activities prescribed for each individual case.

"However," Miss Hall hastened to explain, "the activities are only social and ultimate result of the deep character-building influence these activities exert."

Miss Hall told the group of young women the ever-present need of the settlement for volunteers, and described some of the work these workers do.

Miss Hall is a regular worker on the staff of the Genesee Institute, the Catholic settlement located on North Union Street. The Genesee Institute is managed by the Division of Social Action of the Rochester Catholic Charities.
