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Religion Emphasized As Schools Hold Exercises

Demonstrating the definite place religion has in education were three impressive ceremonies conducted this past week end. Participating were graduates and students of St. Mary's Hospital School of Nursing, on Thursday, of Nazareth College and of Our Lady of Mercy High School, on Sunday.

NAZARETH COLLEGE

"Be good, therefore and you'll do good," summed up the Rev. Gerald B. Phebin, Ph. D. of St. Michael's College in his baccalaureate sermon to Nazareth College graduates at Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral, as he called upon them to enter Catholic Action and to maintain Christian optimism as they face problems of the world.

The occasion was a Solemn Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney at noon with the entire student body in cap and gown, members of the faculty and Sisters of St. Joseph in charge of the college, attending.

Assisting in the Mass were: Assistant Priest, the Rev. Msgr. George A. Deacon; Deacon, the Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergan, Chancellor, and the Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay, Dean. The Rev. Leonard A. Kelly, Subdeacon, the Rev. John M. Duffy, Masters of Ceremonies, and the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey and the Rev. Edward Lyon.

Contrasting the decline of civilization in Europe and the trend toward humanism and materialism with the development of Catholic Action as the Pope from Pius IX down to the present Holy Father urge the restoration of "all things in Christ." Dr. Phebin explained that un-Christian pessimism should be barred from the Catholic mind. America is young, he said, and the world looks to America to build up what the forces of evil have destroyed on the continent of Europe.

"You must play a prominent part with all Catholics of this nation in restoring an ancient Christian culture," Doctor Phebin told the graduates. "When the soul is at peace with God and with self it may safely enter into Catholic Action." An academic procession from Sacred Heart school to the Pro-Cathedral preceded the church services.

Father Keenan emphasized as necessary qualities for the successful nurse, love of God and of neighbor, a spirit of sacrifice and perseverance.

Each of the class received from Bishop Kearney the episcopal throne, a nurse's mantle.
