HOSPITALIZATION FOR FAMILY GROUPS LIMITED

In response to many requests the Board of Directors of the Rochester Hospital Service Corporation on October 3, 1938, authorized the acceptance of individual subscribers and their families on an experimental basis.
An intensive study of the seven months' experience shows that the income in the individual classification was not sufficient to cover the cost of serving such members to say nothing of setting up a reserve for emergencies. For this reason the Board of Directors has discontinued the enrollment of individual subscribers, and this action of the Board is in keeping with its constant policy of safeguarding the subscribers' interests.

The experience in Rochester relative to individuals parallels that of other hospital service plans which have attempted to enroll subscribers and their families outside of groups. In fact in some instances this type of enrollment has seriously impaired the financial status of their plans and this action on the part of the Rochester Board is to prevent any similar occurrence in the Rochester organization.

BIRTH CONTROL EXHIBIT BANNED AT COAST FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO—The Golden Gate Exposition here has banned a projected birth control exhibit.
This action has roused the ire of Mrs. Margaret Sanger, who arrived here a few days ago. She lamented the ban pointing out that literature of her birth control movement is being disseminated at the New York World's Fair.
