REFUGEE SPANIARDS OUST NUNS, BEMUSQUE MASS

PARIS. (AP)—Shocking incidents have occurred at the 2000 Spanish refugee camp in the town of Chambray, near Lyons, where 2000 Spanish refugees have been lodged for four months. The head of the camp expelled the Sisters of the Congregation of the Daughters of St. Martha who with two physical therapists came to visit the camp. Following this the refugees indulged in a burlesque of the Mass. They built an altar, put on grotesque caricatures of sacerdotal vestments, and held a mock marriage ceremony. The burlesque was a child of the refugees who had been expelled from the camp. The Prefect of Chambray has ordered an investigation.

Fr. McArdle Offers Mass For Fred Snite

PARIS.—(AP)—Fred Snite, Jr., the American who traveled across the Atlantic in an "iron lung" to make a novena of thanksgiving for the preservation of his life at the famous Lourdes shrine, received Holy Communion daily at the Grotto. In the refector, through which he must view the world, he saw the miraculous rock, the statue of the Blessed Virgin, the altar and the venerable monks offering.

Holy Father Tells Of Steps Taken To Preserve Peace

The official summary in English translation of the Holy Father's remarks to the Sacred College of Cardinals on the present situation in Europe, follows: "The Holy Father addressed to the Sacred College and particularly to the Venerable Dean, who voiced the good wishes of the Cardinals, an expression of his lively spiritual thanks. He thanked them for their prayers for the peace which they have been praying for with those whom Providence has associated with him and all his most intimate collaborators in the many months of the supreme pastoral office."

Fred was present daily at the procession of the Blessed Sacrament. The altararium was raised before his respirator. At evening, he received Holy Communion daily at the Grotto. In the refector, through which he must view the world, he saw the miraculous rock, the statue of the Blessed Virgin, the altar and the venerable monks offering.

"He then passed on to register the responsibilities of the present hour, an hour charged on a quarter with events which are carrying through the world a great and important change. He said that he would like to see the world united in a common effort to bring about a permanent peace which will lead to construction of a new world."

The bathing was repeated the next day. But, as Fred's father explained, the repeated photographs were not a miracle cure that he has traveled so far, and with such difficulty, to seek. His pilgrimage was the one of thanksgiving for his alive second, one to attain peace of mind and resignation. His father said he never saw his son's face so transfused.

"Nothing can withhold the Holy Father from that activity which is both valuable and holy because, as he said, 'it could not be recalled with the sacred duties of our apostolic ministry and the external obstacles of fear of false interpretation or misunderstanding of our intentions or purposes, all of which are directed toward the good of the world. We have the exercise of that salutary office of peace which is proper to the Church.'"

Thousands of pilgrims and others are praying for Fred Snite. His daily mail is voluminous. An anonymous donor has sent him a letter autographed by St. Bernardine. He had purchased it at a sale in Paris for her son, but she was so touched by the story of Fred Snite that she decided to send it to him instead.

"At this point the Holy Father recalled the action taken by him recently for the preservation of peace, 'announced in the depth of the heart of Our common Father by this spirit of peace and justice at a moment which appeared particularly grave in the lives of the people toward the beginning of last month. We thought it timely, after mature deliberation, to make known to some of the statesmen of great European nations the anxiety which the situation was causing us at that moment. Our fear lest international discussion become aggravated to the point of degenerating into a bloody conflict.'"

The Snites planned to leave Lourdes on Monday, June 5. London.—Noted Redemptorist preacher, the Rev. Stephen Sproule, C.S.R., born in New Zealand 67 years ago, has died of heart disease.

"This step was met in general with the sympathy of the governments. We are glad to say, and after it had come to public attention through no co-operation on our part, it met with the gratitude of the people, as a result of this step. We received assurances of good will and resolve to maintain peace which is so much desired by the people. 'Who could be more satisfied than we at the beginning of a relaxation of tension in men's souls, who could long with greater desire than we that it be consolidated more and more, nor do we wish to waste over it, since other information which we received at the time of the above-mentioned step in regard to the sentiments and intentions of influential statesmen to whom we are most grateful.'"
