THE CATHOLIC SISTERS COLLEGE

The Catholic Sisters College, situated in that section of Washington known as Brookland, and near The Catholic University, is a monument to a pioneer and in itself, a pleasing institution. It was the first of the many Catholic summer schools in the United States and a leader in many of the educational ventures which have become established practice in Catholic circles.

No story of the Catholic Sisters College could be complete without reference to the Rev. Dr. Thomas E. Shields, whose dominant personality is reflected by the institution and by the department of education at the Catholic University, of which he was for a number of years the head.

The next academic year, Dr. Shields was not unaware of the probable extension of his plan through its coming at that time was not expected.
