Here Is Challenge, Holy Name Men!

(After the Rally, what? The question is answered in the following excerpt taken from Father O'Leary's address to 35,000 Holy Name men of Kings County in recent parade and ceremony at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn.)

"My dear men, allow me to congratulate you on this wonderful demonstration of Faith in your God and loyalty to your country. God and country, there is the winning combination! Divided, there is chaos and failure. United, there can be no such things as failure! But remember, this parade, this united demonstration is only the beginning. If it is the end, it will mean nothing, nothing but an idle show, a meaningless ceremony. Recall, if you will, the first Holy Name Parade. It was held on the first Palm Sunday, 20 centuries ago. Men, women and children spread their garments on the streets, cut down palm branches from the trees and marched through Jerusalem. It was all in honor of Jesus their King, and they sang: 'Hosanna to the Son of David; Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord.' (Matthew 21:9). That was certainly a marvelous demonstration of love and loyalty. But that parade, that triumph of Sunday was a dismal failure. Why? Because when the parade was over, the people returned to their homes and forgot what it all meant. One short week later that same Jesus was taken prisoner, beaten beyond recognition, His Sacred Head crowned with thorns and they did not rest until He was hanging dead upon a cross.

"Is your parade going to be a dismal failure too? Is the glorious triumph of this Sunday afternoon going to be changed into a failure before the week is over? Will your Palm Sunday be followed by a Good Friday? It will be a failure, if you return home today, leaving behind you the principles for which you marched. It will be a failure if you do not carry your God and His Sacred Name back into your homes. If you do not let the principles, for which this Holy Name stands, influence your every heart beat, your home life, your dealings with your neighbor, your devotion to your country. But this parade, this Holy Name Rally will be a gloriously never ending triumph if you will leave this arena today better men, more fully determined to give Christ the place of honor in your home, to make Christ a guest at your every conversation, to have Christ a silent partner in your business, to consider Christ and His principles in everything you do and are. Here is a challenge, Holy Name men! Remember, the world is full of corruption and deceit. Christ is watching and watching for you. His heart is about to break again. You are His only hope. Show Him that you are worthy of this trust! Show Him by your lives that one day, and many more through your good example and influence, you are worthy to join Him in the glorious Holy Name Society in Heaven."

Often the best intentions fail to materialize just because the family did not know an early Mass is said. Now, with the "Policemen's Mass" arranged, everyone may start off the day of a trip with a clear conscience.

Evil Literature Now Reaches 60,000,000

SOUTH BEND, IND. - Indecency in print is reaching probably 60,000,000 Americans through the circulation of evil publications, the Most Rev. John F. Noll, Bishop of Fort Wayne, declared in an interview carried over the network of the Columbia Broadcasting System from Station WFAM here. The program was one of a series of four arranged by Columbia. Bishop Noll was interviewed by the Rev. Francis Gartland, C.S.C., prefect of religion at the University of Notre Dame. The two were introduced by James McGoldrick, captain of last year's Notre Dame football team. Replying to an inquiry, Bishop Noll said the aggregate circulation of indecent publications was estimated at 15,000,000. "It is a vast number of them," he said, "offending so seriously against the postal laws that they are denied the second-class mail privilege accorded to other publications."

Pledged In Fight On Communism

Heading the wisdom of Encyclical "Divine Redemptio" - "So to it, Venerable Brethren, that the Faithful do not allow themselves to be deceived! Communism is intrinsically wrong, and no one who would save Christian civilization may collaborate with it in any undertaking whatsoever."
