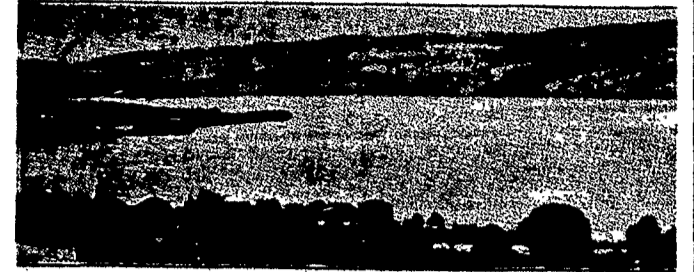

Right of Churches To More of Child's Leisure Time Cited

BUFFALO (NC) Churches and synagogues were urged to assert their claims for more of the leisure time of children, in an address delivered by Arthur L. Swift, Jr., director of student field work at the Union Theological Seminary of New York City. He spoke at the Church Conference of Social Work held here, declaring that extracurricular activities in the public schools are depriving children of their religious education.

"The exclusion by law of religion from our public schools is tantamount to the denial to religion of its real part in the education of the masses of American boys and girls," he said. "This is especially true since the school system has come to pre-empt in various extracurricular activities so much of the leisure time of its pupils as to leave the church but little time for their religious education."

"An hour on Sunday in the church school cannot possibly prove adequate. The church and synagogues have the right and duty to declare that public education in social ethics is not and can never be an adequate substitute for religious education."

"In the field of education there is just now considerable conflict and confusion. Public education, like public charity, in our democratic form of government, must respect the religious convictions of its clients. But whereas charity is usually administered without specific reference to religion at all, there are many who feel that education cannot, especially the education of children."

Fr. Coughlin Flays Neutrality Bill

DETROIT (NC) Striking out again in opposition to neutrality legislation now pending in Congress, the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, pastor of the Shrine of the Little Flower at Royal Oak, Mich., said in his radio address Sunday that these measures, which he called "nothing more than unneutrality bills," would "force the United States and its citizens to commit themselves to a policy of neutrality and complete government by man and not by law."

Asserting that "any tendency which aims at substituting the rule of man for the rule of law must be halted," Father Coughlin said no intelligent person wants to sustain the irregularities and immorality that have characterized the last 100 years. To abandon these irregularities is of vital importance," the speaker said.

"But to abandon them at the cost of destroying the divine and natural laws, including the Commandments of God, the doctrines of Christ and the Constitution of our nation that will lead us from the present depths of our misery to a lower degradation, A rule of sound law is necessary. Saying the pending neutrality legislation would empower the President to aid with arms munitions and credit any nation in all the world suffering from any aggressor whom he judged to be an aggressor," Father Coughlin said "this means that instead of being neutral we would take sides, instead of being peaceful we would participate in the war, instead of upholding the spirit of the Monroe Doctrine, which confines our activities to the Americas, we would spread ourselves over the entire world."

State Fair Events Promise Variety

SYRACUSE Making the first formal announcement of the proposed program for the 1939 Agricultural and Industrial Exposition, Paul Smith Director in an interview yesterday afternoon stated, "It will be a fair for everyone, young and old, with modern and antique exhibits and amusements, with a revival of the home-spun features of Fair gone by."

This year's State Fair will run fifteen days from Saturday, August 26 through Saturday, September 9. The title of the two-week fair was started in 1928 and lengthened this year to include three Saturdays. While the entire program has not been definitely arranged, the majority of features and new exhibits have been announced.

Included in the program, during the second week, is a six-day street-chess meet. A street-chess course has been laid out in the grandstand, in front of the grandstand, to conform with the official regulations of the National Chess Association of America.

The addition of this sport to the program presents a new thrill for the audience. The street-chess meet will be held in conjunction with a six-day running horse meet featuring horses from the finest stables in the country. A feature of this year's exposition is a Spartan's Show to be held during the entire fifteen days in the court of the Fair Machinery Building. This new feature includes such activities as fly and boat casting, log rolling, canoe tipping, log chopping and many other sports new to State Fair visitors.

In an entirely different vein will be the grand and colorful production of "Elijah," famous Mendelssohn oratorio, in the Coliseum Religious Inspirational Day. Featuring the combined voices of the Rochester Chapel and Syracuse A Cappella Chorus, "Elijah" will be presented in its dramatic form for the first time to a Central New York audience.
