Red Publishers Lose

MOSCOW—The annual statement of the anti-religious publishing house of Moscow shows a deficit of 4,000,000 rubles, due to the fact that last year more than 100,000 anti-religious books were distributed gratis. Half of the deficit is to be covered by the Soviet Government, the remainder by the Communist Party.

U.S.-VENEZUELA EXPERTS CARRY ON

CARACAS (NC)—The collaboration which has just taken place here of the Social Service Mission from the United States and Venezuelan experts to map out a program of social action for this country was only a beginning of a new form of international cooperation. The Rev. James M. Drought, M.M., executive officer of the Commission declared in an interview granted here in the city. Later, as the members of the North American Commission were taking leave of Venezuela, Father Drought issued a statement expressing his gratitude to President Contreras for the cooperation of the Venezuelan Social Service Mission for their cordial interest and their sympathetic consideration as a result there was a clarification of ideas.

Jobs For Skilled Negroes Obtained By Priest's Aid

NEW YORK (NC)—The first employment bureau for Negroes qualified to fill highly skilled and professional positions has been opened in Harlem by the Rev. Michael P. Mulvey, C.S.S., pastor of St. Mark's Church who has been accorded a wide recognition as one of the best friends of the Negro. Although numerous agencies have been set up to get menial jobs for Negroes, Father Mulvey's bureau has been established in plain dress-making, dressmaking and other specially skilled jobs. Father Mulvey has not stopped merely offering the talents of the better skilled and better educated Negroes to employers. He has obtained private interviews with heads of utility companies, telephone companies, and other employers and has discussed the subject of race prejudice with them frankly. He has succeeded in some cases in getting the employer to use one or two Negroes at least partially the proportion of the Negro population in the area.

GOERING BOOK PROCLAIMS HITLER INFALLIBILITY

BERLIN—The political infallibility of Adolf Hitler is proclaimed by Goering in his book, "Aufbau eines Nationalsozialistischen Staates." "Building of a National State" published by Mittler, of Berlin. Just as Catholics are convinced the Pope is infallible in all questions affecting religion and morals, the book states, "we declare the National Socialist will be the same interior conviction that for us in all political and other questions affecting the social and national interest of our people Der Fuehrer is infallible."

Hungarian Regent Lauds Pope Pius XII

BUDAPEST (NC)—Current international differences could have no better solution than the peace efforts of "the highest of authorities, His Holiness the Pope," to result in conference of great powers. This was the declaration of Regent Miklos Horthy in the address with which he formally opened Hungary's Parliament on Wednesday. This assertion came in his treatment of foreign issues.

Exist 4 Days On One Duck

CHURCHILL, Manitoba (NC)—To have lived for four days on the Arctic wastes of the Far North on only one wild duck, which was shared with two companions, was but one of the experiences of the Most Rev. Armand Clabaut, O.M.I., Coadjutor Vicar Apostolic of Hudson Bay in his recent pastoral visit. By dog sled and canoe the 35-year-old Bishop, with the Rev. H. Dionne, O.M.I., and an Eskimo guide accompanying him on the final stages, traveled 1,700 miles from Eureka to Churchill, Manitoba. Mary Himes in the course of his passage from the isolated Arctic missions, Bishop Clabaut, and his companions found themselves with practically no food. Storms made game scarce, and a wild duck, brought down by the Bishop, was their only food for four days. Ice floes also caught their canoes, and on several occasions they had to spend days on the ice drifts.

Spain Seeks Return of 30,000 Children

MADRID (NC)—Thirty thousand Spanish children are still abroad today in the countries to which the Reds sent them for propaganda purposes. Three thousand are in Russia. These figures were given by Don Antonio Masada, specially charged by General Franco with their repatriation. The Government is returning 250 children to their respective families in Madrid. Senor Masada hopes to overcome the resistance placed in the way and to bring the children back to their country, even the 3,000 in Russia.

NEW YORK—The Catholic Church of St. Ann in Philadelphia will retain the painting called "Queen of Poland Pray for Us," by Jan Styka, Polish artist, which disappeared from the Columbia Exposition in Chicago. Barcelona's Bishop Was Slain Dec. 3

VATICAN CITY—The date of the death of the Most Rev. Manuel Ciria y Almonacid, Bishop of Barcelona, has been established as December 3, 1939, and has been published in the *Neurologia* of the *Acta Apostolica Sedis*, official publication of the Holy See. Until the taking of Barcelona by Franco's forces, and even for some days afterwards, it was believed that the Bishop of Barcelona and the Most Rev. Anselmo Polanco, Bishop of Teruel, were alive. The latter was killed by the Reds near the French border on February 7, 1939, during their flight bringing the total number of Bishops killed by the Spanish Reds to 12.
